### What Census?

The Census program mentioned at the April meeting is properly named **The Census of Qualified SAR Prospects** and is designed to provide tangible assistance to Chapters in recruiting new members by providing them with long lists of "qualified" prospects living in their areas. These prospects will require minimal additional documentation, and those documents will be on most recent generations.

Within the next few weeks the Census will start with the mailing of Census Report Forms to the first 10,000 SAR members on the alphabetical mailing list of the SAR Magazine. A covering letter from the President General, a sheet of explanations, and a return envelope addressed to the National Census Coordinator will accompany the form.

The completed Census Report Forms should list somewhere between 5 and 10 qualified SAR prospects each. These prospects will all be "qualified" by virtue of being relatives of SAR members and descendants of the same Revolutionary War Patriot Ancestors.

This program offers a method to expand our membership, increase our dues income, and thereby broaden our civic activities. I feel that it will be a very beneficial program deserving our full support, and I urge all members to complete and submit the forms in a timely manner.
