




On a cool blustery April 10, the mysterious melody played by bagpiper Mike Bardwell led the SAR Color Guard to the grave of **John Abston**, the only Revolutionary War patriot buried in Collin County. Color Guard members from the Dallas Chapter who helped to mark the grave included Compatriots **Charles Baker**, **Bill Bellomy**, **Robert Coker**, **Rick Fawkes**, **Ralph McDowell**, **Mel McCoy**, and **Tom Whitelock**. A picture of the marked grave is shown at left, below.

At right, Below: "Present Firelocks" was the command given as members of the North Texas Militia prepared to lead these little Patriots in the Pledge of Allegiance. The occasion was Colonial Day at Providence Christian School in Dallas, and these first graders learned about the colonial way of life, from school to clothing, to foods and games. The nickname at Providence Christian School is "The Patriots." Participating in the flag program and Color Guard were (Left to Right) Compatriots **Art Ingalls** (rifle), **Tom Whitelock** (Bedford Flag), **Tom Smith** (Navy Jack), **Charles Windham** (Fort Moultrie Flag), **Mel McCoy** (13-Star Flag), **Ralph McDowell** (Guilford Court House Flag), **Richard Arnold** (Betsy Ross Flag), **Cliff Slagle** (flintlock), and **Charles Baker** (speaker at podium).
