

I was further honored to participate in the Northern Region TXSSAR Color Guard for this Federal ceremony held in Arlington, Texas. For those of you who have never attended or experienced this very moving patriotic event, let me tell you that it is indeed....special.

From the start of the program, as we (SAR) were called forward to present and post colors, I could sense an air of anticipation by the assembly for what was to occur. I saw a sea of smiling faces and a sincere gleam of appreciation in the eyes of each newly naturalized citizen as they took the Oath of Allegiance in support and defense of our laws and Constitution. There was a satisfying degree of attentiveness as former citizens of sixty-two countries viewed a warm welcoming message by President Bush.

But what affected me most was to hear the strong proud chorus of over 450 men and women recite in unison their loyalty with the Pledge of Allegiance.

You'd be surprised how many parents would bring their children over and explain who we represented in American history. When one young boy stated we looked like Pirates, it was his Grandmother, citizenship certificate and US Flag in hand, that adjusted his learning curve by politely exclaiming: "the only thing these men ever pirated was freedom from the British."

I sincerely hope you, too, have the opportunity to observe and even participate in one of these citizenship ceremonies in the year ahead. It's a great memory that you won't forget. As for me, it seemed the natural thing to do, and thank God, I'm glad I did.





John's patriot ancestor was Col. James Barrett who commanded the Minutemen in the famous battle at Concord's North Bridge. On April 19, 1775, Col. Barrett gave the famous order to advance but hold fire unless fired upon, then to fire as fast as they could. When the British fired the first shots "heard 'round the world," Patriots lay dead. In the battle that followed, the British suffered a humiliating defeat with three times as many casualties as the Patriots. Barrett was the first commander to order American forces to fight against the soldiers of the King of England. "Patriots Day" is still observed as a New England Holiday on April 19.

The statue in the picture at right currently stands outside the Iraqi palace, now home to the 4th Infantry division. It will eventually be shipped home and put in the memorial museum in Fort Hood, Texas.

The statue was created by an Iraqi artist named Kalat, who for years was forced by Saddam Hussein to make the many hundreds of bronze busts of Saddam that dotted Baghdad.

Kalat was so grateful for the American liberation of his country; that he melted three of the heads of the fallen Saddam and made the statue as a memorial to the American soldiers and their fallen warriors. Kalat worked on this memorial night and day for several months.

To the left of the kneeling soldier is a small Iraqi girl giving the soldier comfort as he mourns the loss of his comrade in arms.
