Head greeter **Ralph McDowell** thanked **Chalmers Omberg** for assisting in welcoming twenty members and six guests this morning.



AMERICANISM



Bill's topic was on the **FORT MOULTRIE FLAG**. He handed out minted US quarters that came out in 2016 for South Carolina.



The Battle of Fort Sullivan was fought on June 28, 1776, during the American Revolutionary War. It took place near Charleston, South Carolina, during the first British attempt to capture the city from American rebels.

Arriving in early June, troops were landed on Long Island (now called the Isle of Palms,) near Sullivan's Island where Colonel *William Moultrie* commanded a partially constructed fort in preparation for a naval bombardment and land assault. The naval assault had little effect, due to the sandy soil and spongy nature of the fort's palmetto log construction. It was rumored that cannonballs fired from British ships at the fort bounced back to damage the ships. Col. Moultrie's design of the original flag flown over the fort (and both) were named in honor of his service and defense. The flag was later modified to show a Palm tree.

CURRENT FLAG>





Arms & Armor of the early settlers

Dr. Battles started his very informative and entertaining presentation by alerting the attendees that his "Dutch" heritage will play a key factor in his historical rendering of the 1620 Pilgrims and the influence on America's militia. Although he




was attired in the militia uniform & metal garb of those that arrived on the *Mayflower*, Jim used a slideshow to relate how *Rembrandt van Rijn's Da Nachtwacht* <The Night Watch painting was one example of how each city in the Dutch Republic, having a company militia who fought for their freedom & independence, had portraits made and displayed to honor the soldiers' importance. Compatriot Battles continued to cross reference his story how a thanksgiving battle victory celebration in the city of *Leiden*

led to the establishment of our own pilgrim's first thanksgiving.










Officer & Committee Reports


