FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK:

Greetings Compatriots,

February is a unique Month. Two of America's greatest Presidents were born in her. Abraham Lincoln on the 12th and George Washington on the 22nd. We owe a great deal to the foresight and knowledge of these great Men.

While Washington was responsible for winning the Revolutionary War, without him America would be ten (or thirteen) single colonies bound only by a common language but with different purposes of existence. The New Englanders were most interested in freedom from tyranny and taxation. The Middle Atlantic states of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Northern Virginia were interested in establishing commerce, and the Southern States of Georgia and the Carolinas were interested in crop production. Washington saw that ten (or 13) small colonies could not survive individually against a world power bent on expansion. So he established and encouraged them to remain one.

Lincoln was responsible for holding the Nation together. It was his untimely and dastardly assassination that caused General U.S. Grant to determine to win, at all costs. Even though Abraham Lincoln was hated by much of the population, his death dragged the dissenters into the fold, to fight another day. Many of his policies remain in effect today, and his resolution "...that this Nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government, Of the People, By the People, For the People shall not perish from the earth" endures to our time.

We encourage you to participate in celebrations honoring these two great men.

Molly Pitcher

Mary Ludwig Hayes McCauly was born on October 13, 1744, in a town near Trenton, New Jersey. She later moved to Pennsylvania. When she was only a young teenager, she married William Hayes, a barber. Hayes joined the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War. Mary's story may or may not be partly folklore. Some historians believe her story is the composite of several "Molly's" who helped on the battlefields of the Revolutionary War.

Mary McCauly is best known today for the role that she played in the 1778 Battle of Monmouth (N.J.) as a Continental Army camp follower and original "Molly Pitcher". Like many women of the day she carried pitchers of water for thirsty soldiers or for their smoldering cannons. She probably earned the nickname from soldiers on the battlefield shouting "Molly! Pitcher!" Molly was a common nickname for women named Mary.

Mary earned her legendary status during the Battle of Monmouth Courthouse. After her husband collapsed from the 100-degree heat, or from being wounded, Mary bravely took over as the gunner and continued to fire the cannon herself throughout the scorching day. According to legend, a British cannonball flew between her legs and tore her skirt, to which she responded, "well, that could have been worse."

After the Revolutionary War came to a close, both William and Mary settled in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. After William Hayes' death, Mary married Revolutionary War veteran John McCauly. In 1822, Mary Ludwig Hayes McCauly was awarded a Revolutionary War pension by the Pennsylvania State Legislature for her service at the Battle of Monmouth. "Molly Pitcher" died on January 22, 1832, in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. In 1876, a special marker was laid on her grave commemorating her service as "Molly Pitcher" in the Revolutionary War.

Chapter Trailer to Appear in Medal of Honor Parade

On Saturday, April 13th, the North Texas Color Guard (NTCG) will again participate in the annual Gainesville Medal of Honor Recipient Parade in Gainesville, Texas. This year, Ted Wilson, the NTCG Commander, asked if we would be willing to pull our trailer in the parade. Our response was a resounding YES!

Gainesville has participated in the Medal of Honor Host City Program since its inception in 2001 and is recognized as the only Medal of Honor Host City in America. The city has hosted 56 of the 74 living Medal of Honor Recipients.

The festivities begin on Wednesday, April 10th, with a motorcade from DFW Airport non-stop to Gainesville encompassing multiple police and emergency vehicles plus in excess of 500 motorcycles. On Thursday, a Red Oak tree is planted along the Home Grown Hero's



Walking Trail for every new recipient that comes to Gainesville. There are currently 56 tree's that line what used to be the Katy railroad. Also on Thursday, the best opportunity to meet and shake the hand of living national treasures occurs at the Annual Patriot Dinner. Friday is the annual Medal of Honor Banquet—one of the most anticipated events of the program. The highlight of the week is the Medal of Honor Parade. The entire town turns out to welcome and support the Medal of Honor Recipients and show their American pride. The culmination of the Medal of Honor week finishes with the annual book signing. The merchandise booth will have for sale the newest edition of The Medal of Honor Portrait of Valor book as well as books individually authored by the recipients. This is the best opportunity to spend a little face time with the honored guests and take advantage of a rare opportunity to take photos, get an autograph, and interact with our nation's heroes.

There are three versions of the Medal of Honor, one for each of the military departments of the Department of Defense: Army, Navy, and Air Force. Members of the Marine Corps and Coast Guard are eligible to receive the Navy version. The President, in the name of Congress, has awarded more than 3,500 Medals of Honor to our nation's bravest Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, and Coast Guardsmen since the decoration's creation in 1861.

THIS MONTH DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR (1781-1783):

In February of 1781, Skirmish at Tarrant's Tavern (Torrence's Tavern), North Carolina Located 10 miles from the Catawba River, this tavern saw Lord Cornwallis' soldiers led by Colonel Banastre Tarleton engage a group Patriot militia commanded by William Lee Davidson. The British rout the Patriots but the actual losses incurred are still in dispute.

In February of 1782, French Admiral Pierre Suffren de Saint-Tropez and British Admiral Sir Edward Hughes engage in four actions in the Indian Ocean. The French attack British possessions on the Indian coast and in Ceylon. Suffren captures the port of Trincomalee in Ceylon before returning to the Netherlands at the onset of peace negotiations. Napoleon had a high opinion of Suffren, commenting that he would have become France's Lord Nelson, had he survived.

In February of 1783, George III issues Cornwall's Proclamation of Cessation of Hostilities (which would later culminate, in September, with the Paris Peace Treaty), ending the American Revolution.

Sweden recognizes United States independence.

Spain ends its siege of Gibraltar.
