FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK:

Greetings Compatriots,

Spring is upon us with all its blooming and budding. Leaves have returned to many of the trees, and weeds and pollen abound. Also, Daylight Savings time with the forward jumping of our clocks. Soon yards will bloom with the beautiful flowers and we will press winter into our memory. But wait, April is the month of showers. And Easter is not yet. Doesn't it always freeze after Easter??? Maybe not this year.

It was mid-April in 1776 when the North Carolina Provincial Legislature met and adopted the Halifax Resolves - an official resolution calling for independence from Great Britain. These Resolves authorized the North Carolina delegates at the Second Continental Congress to join with those from other Colonies to declare independence from British rule. Along with the Mecklenburg Resolves, the Halifax Resolves had been preceded by the Leedstown (Westmoreland) Resolves some ten years earlier. That document, crafted by Richard Henry Lee, was the first effort by the Colonies in resistance to the Stamp Act. The names of the signers of the Leedstown document are etched in marble in the Westmoreland County, Virgina Courthouse wall. All three of these documents led to our Declaration of Independence. Those actions were not taken lightly but were entered at great risk to the signers.

Today, our Nation faces a great divide not seen since the Civil War. Brother against Brother, Parents against Children, and Children against Parents.

In the Pledge to the SAR, "we reaffirm our faith in the principles of liberty and our Constitutional Republic, and solemnly pledge ourselves to defend them against every foe."

I pray that we never take those words lightly. They have meaning.

Jeff is a military veteran and is employed by Southwest Airlines. He and Teresa are the proud parents of three sons (future members, per-










THIS MONTH DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR (1781-1783):

In March of 1781, the Continental Congress ratifies the Articles of Confederation initially proposed by Richard Henry Lee on June 7, 1776. After a long delay these articles are sent to the individual states for ratification on November 15, 1777. Bickering over land claims between Virginia and Maryland holds up ratification until March 1, 1781. The nation is guided by the Articles of Confederation until the ratification of the Constitution on November 21, 1788.

British troops win a costly victory over Continentals and militia at Guilford Courthouse, N.C. The battle is part of General Nathanael Greene's strategy of engaging the British on ground of his choosing. Without winning a single clear-cut victory, he will succeed in wearing down the British army through hit-and-run tactics and set-piece battles.

In March of 1782, the Battle of Little Mountain, Kentucky (Estill's Defeat), occurring during Kentucky's "Year of Blood," was a fierce fight in the lightly settled territory, claimed at that time by Virginia. James Estill, a veteran Indian fighter, is somehow unaware of an Indian camp some half mile away. Estill's band of 35 is attacked and defeated in a two-hour fight. A number of his men are killed and about 20 Indians are casualties.

In March of 1783, General Washington denounces a threat by his officers to rebel against Congress.


How the D.C. Got in Washington, D.C.

In 1790, a year after George Washington took office as president, Congress authorized him to find a site along the Potomac River for the new nation's capital. It was the first time a country had ever established its permanent capital by legislative action. The president ended up choosing a spot just a few miles upstream from his home at Mount Vernon, Virginia.

Surveyors staked out an area of one hundred square miles straddling the river. The idea was to create a special territory, not part of any state, to contain the capital city. The land came from Maryland and Virginia, and the territory was named the "District of Columbia" ("D.C." for short) in honor of Christopher Columbus.

George Washington hired French engineer Pierre L'Enfant to plan the city that would lie within the new District. In 1791, the District's commissioners decided to name that city "Washington" in honor of the first president. The federal government moved there in 1800.





On May 3, 1802, Washington was incorporated as a city, with a city council elected by local residents, and a mayor appointed by the president. People began to refer to the capital city inside the District of Columbia as "Washington, D.C."—just as they might write "Albany, N.Y." or "Charleston, S.C."

For a long time Washington remained a relatively small town, and much of the land inside the District of Columbia lay undeveloped. In 1846 Congress decided it would never need the District's land on the south side of the Potomac River, so it returned that portion to the state of Virginia. But of course the city did eventually grow, especially after World War II. Today it fills virtually the entire District of Columbia.

Awards, Awards, and More Awards!!!

The SAR Society offers a number of awards to members of the society. Here's a list of some of the more common awards.



CHAPTER DISTINGUISHED SERVICE

The incumbent Chapter President may present one medal during his term (or each year of his term if elected to a multiyear term) at the Chapter's Annual Meeting, to a Compatriot in recognition for that Compatriot's conspicuous service to the Chapter during the president's administration.

WAR SERVICE MEDAL

The War Service Medal was first authorized in 1899 for members who served in the Spanish-American War. It was subsequently authorized for members who served in World War I and World War II. Following World War II, the NSSAR authorized a generic War Service Medal with specific service periods indicated by bronze bars. This medal may be purchased by the member.





MILITARY SERVICE MEDAL

It may be presented by a chapter or society to SAR members who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States, Coast Guard, or a country that was an ally of the United States, or in a United Nations Peace Keeping Force, who otherwise do not qualify for the SAR War Service Medal. This medal may be purchased by the member.



This SAR Member medal is earned for substantial contributions to the SAR over an extended period of time, normally a three to five year period.





BRONZE ROGER SHERMAN MEDAL

The Bronze Roger Sherman Medal may be awarded to a compatriot in recognition of, and in appreciation of, outstanding services rendered to a Chapter. The medal is presented to a compatriot for significant service which lacks the requirements for the Meritorious Service Medal. The recipient must have served as an active officer for a minimum of two years, as an active committee chairman for three years, or as an active member of a committee for four years.

R.I.P Tommy Gene Copeland, NSSAR & Texas Society Life Member

KELLER - Tommy Gene (Tom) Copeland, 85, Major US Army (retired), of Keller TX, passed away peacefully with family by his side on December 20, 2018 after a battle with dementia. Tom was born on August 26, 1933, in Bosqueville, TX to Odis Walter and Willie Mae McCutcheon Copeland and was the youngest of 11 children. Tom retired from the US Army after 22 years of military service. He served two tours during the Vietnam war, receiving two purple hearts, two bronze stars, the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry and numerous other medals and awards. After retiring from the Army, he went to work in Saudi Arabia as a manager in the Saudi Arabian Army Logistics Department. Upon returning to the United States, he worked for International Telephone and Telegraph in Houston and then, became the Manager of the Market Square La Quinta Inn in San Antonio, TX. At age 59, Tom retired for good, moving to Canyon Lake, TX, and spent several years relaxing and traveling with his wife. Later, he moved to Tyler, TX, where he enjoyed spending time with friends and family. Tom was a lifetime member of the American Legion, DAV, Military Officer Association, and Purple Heart Association. He was especially proud of being in the Sons of the American Revolution, where he served in the Tyler TX Chapter as president. In 2015, he moved to Keller to be near family.

Tom was predeceased by his parents, four brothers - Walter, Harland, Marland, and Harold, six sisters - Malzie, Betty, Virgie, Mary, Lillian, and a stillborn sister, and one son, Steven Copeland. Tom is survived by his wife of over 61 years Bernadine (Dene) of Keller TX, and three sons, Walter and Marci Copeland of Westlake, TX, William and Susan Copeland of West Monroe, LA, and Thomas Copeland and partner Diane Weber of Milipitas, CA. He is also survived by five grandchildren: John Copeland and wife Jessica of Highland Park IL, Wendy Copeland-Hogg and husband Casey Hogg of Austin, TX, Krysten Copeland of Grants Pass, OR, Melissa Copeland of Portland, OR, and Christine Copeland of Oslo, Norway, and great grandchildren Kaylee and Jordan

Copeland of Highland Park, IL. Tom is also survived by many nieces, nephews and friends.

Tom's body was donated to UT Southwestern in Dallas TX for medical research. A memorial service honoring Tom's life will be scheduled in March, and a graveside service for his ashes will be held on a later date at the family plot in Bosqueville, TX.

He was a NSSAR and Texas Life member and a member of the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter in the Texas Society.

The family held a memorial service for Tom at the chapel of St Laurence Anglican Church, 519 Kimball Avenue, Southlake, Texas, on Saturday, March 9, at 11:00 am.

Inurnment will be at Bosqueville Cemetery in Bosqueville, McLennan County, Texas.
