#### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK:

Greetings Compatriots,

What comes to mind when you think or hear the name August?? The last month of Summer vacation? Reactivation of School Zones with restricted cellular use and slower traffic? Hot, dry, dog days before the coming cooler days of Autumn?

On a more serious note, in August, the first Atomic Bomb was dropped over the center of Hiroshima by the American B-29 bomber Enola Gay. The bomb detonated about 1,800 ft. above ground, killing over 105,000 persons and destroying the city. Another estimated 100,000 persons later died as a result of radiation effects. Two days later, the second Atomic bombing of Japan occurred as an American B-29 bomber chose a secondary target, Nagasaki. That bomb detonated about Noon, killing an estimated 70,000 persons and destroying about half the city. Following the two Atomic Bomb drops and believing that continuation of the war would only result in further loss of Japanese lives, delegates of Emperor Hirohito accepted Allied surrender terms. His announcement was broadcast via radio to the Japanese people at Noon the next day after which President Truman announced that Japan had surrendered to the Allies. The formal surrender ceremony occurred 20 days later, on board the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay.

On August 2, 1776, in Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the Declaration of Independence, including John Hancock who wrote large letters reportedly so King George could read it without his glasses.

The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified in August, which granted women the right to vote, and a proclamation admitting Hawaii to the Union as the 50th State was signed in August.

The Social Security Act establishing the system which guarantees pensions to those who retire at age 65 was signed into Law in August.

August also marked the beginning-of-the-end for the Soviet Union, following a hardline Communist coup attempt that failed.

Randoll was approved for SAR membership on February 18, 1998. He served as Chapter Vice President for a couple of terms and was a member of the Color Guard until he was no longer able to do so.

#### **OBITUARY**

Randoll U. Reagan was born on December 13, 1934 to Tom and Lela Clark Reagan in Bransford (now Colleyville). Randoll volunteered for the US Marine Corps and served from 1953 to 1956. He met Joyce Williams at the Southside Church of Christ and they were married there on August 8, 1959. Two sons were born to that union, Thomas and Robert. Randoll was a graduate of Texas Wesleyan University. He retired from Texas New Mexico Power. Randoll was a life-long member of the church of Christ. He was a former elder of the Colleyville Church of Christ and current member of the College Hills Church of Christ. Randoll and Joyce were RV'ers and traveled to all 50 states and much of Canada. After retiring they became Sojourners, a ministry of the churches of Christ. They worked at children's homes, youth camps, etc. for many years. Randoll enjoyed working with cars and was active in the North Texas Cadillac/LaSalle Club. He was a writer for an automotive magazine. He was a member of the Maj K M VanZandt SAR.

Randoll was predeceased by his parents; and sisters, Etta Ruth Medford and Darreatha Welborn. Survivors include his wife of almost 60 years; sons, Thomas Reagan of Arlington and Robert Reagan (Sharon) of Fort Worth; granddaughters, Jennifer McIntyre (Trevor) and Kristen Williams; great- granddaughters, McKenzie, Maxine, Jorden and

This is an honor for our two chapters to be selected to host this event and puts us in line to host the annual Texas SAR Convention a couple of years down the line. As with every task, it comes with the responsibility to host a memorable, smooth-running event that meets the organizational needs of the Texas organization and is financially successful for the Youth fund programs of the organization, at both the State level and with both the Arlington and Van Zandt chapter youth programs.

What is a Board of Managers (BOM) meeting? This is an official SAR meeting held once a year around the State and is the setting for meetings of various committees, groups, and organizations of the Texas SAR Society. Activities include setting of Policy; funding of various youth programs, the ROTC / JROTC medal program, Eagle Scout program, Texas Agriculture students program, along with other programs. It is generally attended by State and chapter officers but is open to any and all SAR members. Attending the BOM is an excellent way of seeing the behind-the-scenes operation of the Texas organization. Plus, this is a good opportunity for you to attend a BOM right here in our part of the State; in addition, we are one of the sponsoring chapters.

What can each chapter member do to make sure we host a successful event? You can support our efforts by volunteering to help and by registering to attend the meeting. We have a group of volunteers but can always use more to ensure the work load is spread around. If you want to become a volunteer, send me an email or get hold of any of the chapter officers. Your registration will help the chapters with the funding of the event. Your purchase of the raffle tickets, banquet meals, the 50-50 cash drawing tickets, all of this will help secure the financial success of the event. Each year in the fall, we have youth from around the community enter the various contests to help with college costs and / or to improve their 'resume' when applying to college. We want to ensure the chapter has funds for these programs and that we have the option to increase the funds in the future. Bring your spouse and encourage her to assist the Ladies Auxiliary. A Ladies Auxiliary membership is not required, but is only \$5 per year. The Ladies' Saturday morning tour promises to be a good time.



Are you missing out?

#### THIS MONTH DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR (1781-1783):

In August of 1781, Virginia General Cornwalllis, after unsuccessfully trying to engage Nathanael Green's forces, decides to rest his troops at the small port of Yorktown on the Chesapeake Bay. This, he believes, will enable him to communicate freely with General Clinton whose army is in New York.


Patriot militia officer Isaac Hayne is executed by the British. Prior to the war he is a horse breeder and owns an iron works. Hayne is captured at Charleston and paroled, but later the British attempt to have him join the Loyalist militia. Hayne considers the terms of his parole invalidated by this action and once again joins the Patriots. He is again captured but this time hanged as a spy without a trial.

Donald McDonald, leading a combined force of 60 Indians and Loyalists, surprises the Patriots as they work in the fields near Shell's Bush, New York. Most run to Fort Clayton about five miles away but a German, John Christian Shell (Schell?), and his family make a stand in their blockhouse. McDonald is wounded, captured, and dies the next day, after his leg is amputated. Additionally, Shell and 11 attackers are also killed while another six of their number are wounded in the failed raid.

Colonel William Harden commands a detachment of soldiers at Parker's Ferry located approximately 30 miles from Charleston, South Carolina. Loyalists numbering 450 men commence an uprising and are to be reinforced by 200 dragoons commanded by Major Thomas Fraser. Fraser moves his men undetected until his force falls victim to a Patriot ambush just short of his objective. Three successive volleys of musket fire by the Patriots severely maul the ranks of the dragoons. Only the shortage of ammunition among the Patriots saves the dragoons, who lose half their force in the skirmish.

In August of 1782, late in the war, a combined force of British regulars and Loyalists are attempting to obtain forage for Charleston near Combahee Ferry, South Carolina. Upon discovering British intention, the Patriots dispatch a force commanded by Colonel John Laurens to interdict them. Unfortunately, Laurens and his men fall into a trap and are ambushed, resulting in the death of Laurens and one other American.

In August of 1783, no action occurred of significant note.



#### George Washington Creates the Purple Heart Medal

August 7, 1782

On this day in 1782, in Newburgh, New York, General George Washington, the commander-in-chief of the Continental Army, created the "Badge for Military Merit," a decoration consisting of a purple, heart-shaped piece of silk, edged with a narrow binding of silver, with the word Merit stitched across the face in silver. The badge was to be presented to soldiers for "any singularly meritorious action" and permitted its wearer to pass guards and sentinels without challenge. The honoree's name and regiment were also to be inscribed in a "Book of Merit."



Washington's "Purple Heart" was awarded to only three known soldiers during the Revolutionary War: Elijah Churchill, William Brown, and Daniel Bissell, Jr. The "Book of Merit" was lost, and the decoration was largely forgotten until 1927, when General Charles P. Summerall, the U.S. Army chief of staff, sent an un-

successful draft bill to Congress to "revive the Badge of Military Merit." In 1931, Summerall's successor, General Douglas MacArthur, took up the cause, hoping to reinstate the medal in time for the bicentennial of George Washington's birth. On February 22, 1932, Washington's 200th birthday, the U.S. War Department announced the creation of the "Order of the Purple Heart."

In addition to aspects of Washington's original design, the new Purple Heart also displays a bust of Washington and his coat of arms. The Order of the Purple Heart, the oldest American military decoration for military merit, is awarded to members of the U.S. armed forces who have been killed or wounded in action against an enemy. It is also awarded to soldiers who have suffered maltreatment as prisoners of war.







# Arlington is Finalist for National Medal of Honor Museum

The National Medal of Honor Museum Foundation announced on June 26th, 2019, that, following a national search, Denver, Colorado, and Arlington, Texas, have been selected as finalist for the future home of the National Medal of Honor Museum. The goal of the search is to ensure the newly created museum will have the highest impact on the largest number of people possible. The final city selection will be announced in September.

The Medal of Honor, the nation's highest and most prestigious military honor, has been awarded to more than 3,500 military service members since the first medal was presented in 1863. The National Medal of Honor Museum will offer an experience that draws personal and emotional connections to Medal of Honor recipients and their inspiring stories, while shedding light on the wars in which they fought and the ideals that the Medal of Honor represents.

The museum also announced that it will work with Congress to create the first-ever monument in Washington, D.C., dedicated to honoring the more than 3,500 Medal of Honor recipients. The Congressional Medal of Honor Memorial will join other national landmarks in the country's capital, and draw a maximum level of visibility and support from every corner of the United States.
