FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK:

Greetings Compatriots,

Fall has come upon us although you cannot tell by the temperature. September 2019 was the driest September recorded. October marks many important dates.

It was on October 12, 1492 that Christopher Columbus first landed in the Caribbean Islands with his three small Spanish vessels, the Santa Maria, Niña, and La Pinta, after a 33-day voyage. He named the first land sighted as El Salvador, claiming it in the name of the Spanish Crown. Seeking a western sea route from Europe to Asia, he believed he had found an island of the Indies. Therefore he called the first island natives he met, 'Indians.'

Five US Presidents were born in October: the 2nd, John Adams (1735-1826); the 19th, Rutherford B. Hayes (1822-1893); the 21st, Chester A. Arthur (1830-1886); the 26th, Theodore Roosevelt (1858-1919); and 34th, Dwight D. Eisenhower (1890-1969). Both Mt. Rushmore National Monument and the Statue of Liberty were completed in October.

The cornerstone of the White House, located at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, was laid in October by George Washington. First known as the "Presidential Palace," it acquired the name "White House" about 10 years after its completion. It was burned by the British in 1814, then reconstructed, refurbished and reoccupied in 1817.

US Supreme Court Justices Thurgood Marshall and Clarence Thomas, both African-Americans, became Associate Justices in October.

The Gregorian Calendar took effect correcting a 10-day error accumulated by the Julian Calendar. The American colonies adopted the Gregorian Calendar in 1752.

Greenwich was established as the universal time from which standard times throughout the world are calculated.

The United States Navy was born in October after the Second Continental Congress authorized the acquisition of a fleet of ships. The United Nations was founded

Massing of the Colors and Service of Remembrance Sunday, November 10, 2019


You are invited to participate in the 39th Annual Massing of the Colors and Service of Remembrance hosted by the Fort Worth Chapter, Military Order of the World Wars (MOWW), and the Fort Worth ISD JROTC. The non-denominational service honors our flag and America's veterans on the afternoon of Sunday, November 10, 2018, at 2:30 pm at Trimble Tech High School Auditorium, 1003 W. Cannon Street, Ft. Worth.

Colonel Kenny Weldon, USAF, Retired, Commandant, Texas Corps of Cadets, Tarleton State University has graciously accepted our invitation as the keynote speaker for this patriotic event. Stirring military-type music will again be provided by the Frontier Brigade Band with a brief concert beginning at 2:00 pm.

The Massing of the Colors is a patriotic ceremony that provides a living tribute to our heritage and rededicates our faith in the Flag of the United States. It demonstrates our support for the Colors of the United States of America, and for the men and women of our uniformed services under whose Colors they chose to serve. It combines the colors and color guards of Active and Reserve Component military units, ROTC/JROTC Units, Veterans' Organizations, Civic and Patriotic organizations, including Boy and Girl Scout units from the local councils.

Unit participation should include two (2) members representing each unit to carry the flags (1 for the American flag and 1 for the Unit flag). Additional attendees are also invited to attend the ceremony.

The Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter will again provide two members of the Color Guard to represent our SAR chapter. All members are welcome to attend.

Revolutionary War Spies

During the American Revolutionary War both the Americans and their British enemy utilized numerous spies and spying techniques to obtain crucial information about their opponent. Who some of these spies were and how they served their cause have been lost to history. Below is a list of a few of the known spies, along with a short description of each.

Benedict Arnold is perhaps the most famous of all the American Revolutionary War spies. This traitor to America's fight for independence started off as a trusted general to George Washington but eventually started providing the British with secret military information. Before being found out to be a spy, he was planning on surrendering the fort at West Point, New York, to the British.

Nathan Hale Facts was a famous American spy who was captured by the British in New York City. Before being hung by the British, he is reported to have said "I only regret that I have but one life to give for my country".

Culper Spy Ring was organized by American Major Benjamin Tallmadge. The spies supplied George Washington with crucial information about the British who were occupying New York City.

John Andre was a British spy captured by the Continental Army in 1780 and hung. Papers found stashed in his boot alerted the Americans that General Benedict Arnold was a traitor and planned to surrender the fort at West Point, New York.

Haym Salomon was a Jewish immigrant who supplied George

Washington with information after the Americans evacuated New York City in 1776. He was a member of the New York branch of the Sons of Liberty. He twice escaped the British after being arrested as a spy.

James Armistead Lafayette was a slave who acted as a spy for the French General Marquis de Lafayette who was fighting for the Americans. He supplied Lafayette information about the actions of the American traitor Benedict Arnold and British General Cornwallis.

Lydia Darrah supplied George Washington with crucial information about the British including a pending attack during the British occupation of Philadelphia Pennsylvania.

Catharine Moore Barry warned the American forces that the British Army was about to attack before the crucial Battle of Cowpens.


Hercules Mulligan owned a clothing shop in New York City that was frequented by British officers during their occupation of the city. On many occasions, Mulligan learned from his patrons of British plans, including two to capture George Washington. He wasted no time in informing the Americans of the crucial information he obtained.

Abraham Patten was an American spy who was executed on June 13th of 1777 by the British.

Daniel Bissell pretended to be a deserter from the Continental Army and joined the British Army where he gathered important information which he passed along to George Washington.



Chapter Presents Two Heroism Awards and a Life-Saving Award to Fort Worth Police Officers

On Thursday afternoon, September 12th, chapter officers traveled to the Fort Worth Police Department head-quarters to present awards to three FWPD officers. Chapter officers were (left to right): Color Guard Commander Bobby Gresham, Immediate Past President Mike Connelley, Chapter President Gerry Gieger, and Secretary/Acting Registrar Ron Turner. They are standing in front of FWPD Officer Hank Nava's patrol car who died in the line of duty on December 1, 2005. The patrol car is now stationed on permanent display in the lobby of the Police and Fire Administration building at the Bob Bolen Public Safety Complex, 505 W. Felix St. The display will honor Nava and others who have made the ultimate sacrifice in their service to Fort Worth.


"On August 14, 2019, two vehicles collided in the intersection of Glen Garden and Riverside Drive [in Fort Worth]. Two Officers working in a plain clothes capacity observed the accident and one of the cars catch on fire. The two Officers, along with a Corporal, ran to the burning vehicle and were able to rescue the driver to safety. After doing this, the Officers were then able to remove the other driver of the second vehicle and called for marked police, fire, and MedStar units to respond. Based on the quick actions of these Officers, it is apparent that they saved the lives of these two citizens quickly preventing serious injury or death from the fiery collision." The Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter recognized two of the officers with the SAR Heroism Medal and the third officer with the SAR Life Saving Medal. Due to the sensitive nature of the three officer's work, they cannot be identified.

The chapter officers are pictured with Acting Fort Worth Police Chief Ed Krause, a long-time friend and supporter of our SAR chapter.



THIS MONTH DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR (1781-1783):

In October of 1781, The British, commanded by Thomas Dundas, are foraging near Gloucester, Virginia, when they encounter French cavalry commanded by General de Choisy. In a short clash, three Frenchmen are killed and 16 wounded. British losses are unknown but they retreat, leaving the French in command of the field of battle.

Realizing the hopelessness of his situation, Cornwallis proposes terms of surrender to Washington. He will surrender his war material and states that his men will no longer engage in war against the United States or France. Cornwallis also wishes for his officers to retain their side arms and personal baggage.

Lord Cornwallis surrenders at Yorktown, Virginia, and over 7,000 British soldiers march off into captivity to the tune "The World Turned Upside Down." The British are unable to marshal another army in America and this virtually ensures American independence although it will take until November 30, 1782, for the colonists and England to sign a provisional peace treaty.

A combined British, Loyalist, and Indian force, led by Major John Ross, launches a raid in the Mohawk Valley, New York, but is nipped in the bud by a combination of lack of Indian interest, muddy roads, and the possibility of encountering Patriot militia commanded by Colonel Marinus Willett. This is the last attempted British offensive in Tryon County.

Colonel Willett's Patriots catch up with the retreating force commanded by Major Ross at West Canada Creek in Jersey-field, New York. At a point that is fairly deep and wide, shooting breaks out and a number of men on each side are hit. Loyalist leader Walter Butler is mortally wounded and later scalped by an Oneida Indian. Patriots pursue the Loyalists for 20 miles before giving up the chase.

In October of 1782, Spain's primary objective upon entering the American Revolution was to regain Gibraltar from the British. The 46 ship-of-the-line Franco-Spanish squadron commanded by Admiral Cordoba vastly outnumbers the 35 ships-of-the line belonging to Admiral Sir Richard Howe. In a four-hour engagement called the Battle of Cape Spartel (Morocco), each side incurs over 600 casualties. However, the British retain possession of Gibraltar and manage to maintain control of the vital supply routes leading to the island.

In October of 1783, Congress votes to build a second "federal town" on the banks of the Potomac River, with plans to alternate sessions between there and Philadelphia.

Virginia emancipates slaves who fought for independence during the Revolutionary War.
