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

## COMMEMORATIVE BRICK / NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY

Those of us who are retired ARMY have been aware of the "Campaign for the National Museum of the United States Army" for some time now. The National Army Museum will be located on 84 acres at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, less than 30 minutes south of our nation's capital in Washington, D.C. The main building will be approximately 185,000 square feet and display selections from the Army Art Collection, artifacts, documents, and images. The vast majority of these rare and priceless artifacts have never been seen by the American people. The Museum will welcome an estimated 500,000 to 700,000 visitors every year.



The good news is that the public opening of the museum that was scheduled for June 4,

2020, has been delayed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. As they are putting the finishing touches on the museum, their Commemorative Brick program is still in full swing. These bricks will pave the promenade area and other areas on the museum campus. If you would like to honor your Army Veteran or your Revolutionary War Patriot, you can go to their Commemorative Brick weblink and order a brick.

## NSSAR PATRIOT RECORDS COMMITTEE SEEKS VOLUNTEERS

The national Patriot Records Committee needs Texas members to enter lineages into the Patriot Research System (PRS). If you have never been to the PRS web page, go to the SAR website at www.sar.org and place your mouse over the Genealogy pull-down menu. Listed there, fourth from the bottom, is the Patriot Research System link. Click it and you will be taken to an introduction page on which you will see the yellow Patriot Research System button. Click that to be taken to the website.

If you are interested in entering lineages, contact Compatriot Bob Cohen <<u>r-cohen@aggienetwork.com</u>> who will put you in touch with Gary Green who is the National Chair of the Patriot Records Committee. Gary will help you get started entering lineages.

#### PATRIOT BIOGRAPHIES UPDATE

There are a total of 15,775 Patriot Biographies submitted to the PRS as of 31 May 2020. Since 28 February 2020, 466 Patriot Biographies have been added. The percentage of Patriots with Biographies is currently 9.1%.

#### UTILIZATION OF PRS

The national office is seeing substantial progress in all aspects of the PRS—availability of new records coming from NSSAR HQ, the integration of records from Ancestry.com (driven by the Digitization Committee request), and with a significant growth in volunteer activity. The growth in data availability is also driving significant growth in users of the PRS website.

For example, during 2018, there were 1,000,000 page views which averaged 2,890 pageviews per day (346 days). In the first eight months of 2019, the page views increased to 2,000,000 for an average of 4,201 pageviews per day (238 days). For the period from late August 2019 until mid-February 2020, there were 3,000,000 pageviews for an average of 5,524 per day (181 days) and from 19 February 2020 until 31 May 2020, the pageviews increased to 3,941,274 for an average of 9,228 pageviews per day (102). By 08 June 2020 (just eight days), the number of pageviews was expected to break 4,000,000.

#### VOLUNTEER PROGRESS

The real reason for the growth in activity on the website is due to the efforts of SAR volunteers. The PRS is making great strides in reviewing the application data, with 88% of applications from 1998 to now being linked to the respective patriot record, and more than 83% from 1985 to now. Combine that with more than 1/3 of the lineage data entered for 1985-current, and it is easy to recognize how the PRS is improving in value to our membership and prospective members.

The excerpt from the full list of states provides a brief summary of the project status for Texas versus the total for all 50 states.

## CHAPTER TO PLACE NEW HEADSTONE FOR "REAL DAUGHTER OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION"

Sarah D. Henderson is a daughter of Revolutionary War Soldier, Gordon White. Her stone (pictured at right) is in sad condition at Oakwood Cemetery in Fort Worth. Compatriot James Alderman offered a proposal at the July meeting of the Major K.M. Van Zandt Chapter that we take on providing a replacement marker to be placed at the base of the current broken one to acknowledge this lady and her father Gordon White. The membership approved the proposal.

**GENEALOGY---** Mrs. Sarah D. Henderson, Jan. 27, 1803 – Aug. 11, 1884, who lies buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Fort Worth, Tarrant County, Texas, was the daughter of a Virginia Revolutionary patriot named Gordon White.

Mrs. Henderson is buried in Block 11, Lot 53, Space 6. The next grave to the north is that of her granddaughter, Sallie Henderson Burts (1857-1902). Oakwood's records show the next grave to the north is empty.

The next grave north of the empty space is Mrs. Henderson's son-inlaw, William Paxton Burts (1827-1895), who was the first mayor of Fort Worth, Texas. The next grave to the north of Mr. Burts' is that of his wife, Ann Gordon (Henderson) Burts (1831-1914), who was the daughter of Mrs. Henderson. The next grave to the north is another of the Burts children, Josephine, who died in 1923.



Michael Signer takes a fresh look at the life of our fourth president. His focus



## Bunker Hill: A City, A Siege, A Revolution

With passion and insight, he reconstructs the revolutionary landscape—geographic and ideological—in a mesmerizing narrative of the robust, messy, blisteringly real origins of America.


## BATTLE OF LONG ISLAND

The Battle of Long Island, also known as the Battle of Brooklyn and the Battle of Brooklyn Heights, was a military action of the American Revolutionary War fought on August 27, 1776, at the western edge of Long Island in the presentday borough of Brooklyn, New York. The British defeated the Americans and gained control of the strategically important Port of New York, which they held for the rest of the war. It was the first major battle to take place after the United States declared its independence on July 4, 1776, and in troop deployment and combat, it was the largest battle of the entire war.

After defeating the British in the Siege of Boston on March 17, 1776, commander-in-chief George Washington relocated the Continental Army to defend the port city of New York, located at the southern end of Manhattan Island. Washington understood that the city's harbor would provide an excellent base for the Royal Navy, so he established defenses there and waited for the British to attack. In July, the British, under the command of General William Howe, landed a few miles across the harbor on the sparsely populated Staten Island, where they were reinforced by a fleet of ships in Lower New York Bay over the next month and a half, bringing their total force to 32,000 troops. Washington knew the difficulty in holding the city with the British fleet in control of the entrance to the harbor at the Narrows, and accordingly moved the bulk of his forces to Manhattan, believing that it would be the first target.

On August 22, the British landed on the shores of Gravesend Bay in southwest Kings County, across the Narrows from Staten Island and more than a dozen miles south of the established East River crossings to Manhattan. After five days of waiting, the British attacked the American defenses on the Guan Heights. Unknown to the Americans, however, Howe had brought his main army around their rear and attacked their flank soon after. The Americans panicked, resulting in twenty percent losses through casualties and capture, although a stand by 400 Maryland and Delaware troops prevented greater losses. The remainder of the army retreated to the main defenses on Brooklyn Heights. The British dug in for a siege, but on the night of August 29–30, Washington evacuated the entire army to Manhattan without the loss of supplies or a single life. The Continental Army was driven out of New York entirely after several more defeats and forced to retreat through New Jersey to Pennsylvania.

### FOUNDING FATHER JOHN DICKINSON

John Dickinson (November 13, 1732 – February 14, 1808), a Founding Father of the United States, was a solicitor and politician from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and Wilmington, Delaware, known as the "Penman of the Revolution" for his twelve *Letters from a Farmer in Pennsylvania*, published individually in 1767 and 1768. As a member of the First Continental Congress, where he was a signee to the Continental Association, Dickinson drafted most of the 1774 Petition to the King, and then, as a member of the Second Continental Congress, wrote the 1775 Olive Branch Petition. When these two attempts to negotiate with King George III of Great Britain failed, Dickinson reworked Thomas Jefferson's language and wrote the final draft of the 1775 Declaration of the Causes and Necessity of Taking Up Arms. When Congress then decided to seek independence from Great Britain, Dickinson served on the committee that wrote the Model Treaty, and then wrote the first draft of the 1776–1777 Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union.

Dickinson later served as President of the 1786 Annapolis Convention, which called for the Constitutional Convention of 1787. Dickinson attended the Convention as a delegate from Delaware.

He also wrote "The Liberty Song" in 1768, was a militia officer during the American Revolution, President of Delaware, President of Pennsylvania, and was among the wealthiest men in the British American colonies. Upon Dickinson's death, President Thomas Jefferson recognized him as being "Among the first of the advocates for the rights of his country when assailed by Great Britain whose 'name will be consecrated in history as one of the great worthies of the revolution."

Together with his wife, Mary Norris Dickinson, he is the namesake of Dickinson College (originally John and Mary's College), as well as of the Dickinson School of Law of Pennsylvania State University and the University of Delaware's Dickinson Complex. John Dickinson High School was opened/dedicated in 1959 as part of the public schools in northern Delaware.

Dickinson died at Wilmington, Delaware and was buried in the Friends Burial Ground.
