# Texas Society-Announces Patriot Medal-Awardees for 2022

On Saturday afternoon, October 9th, at the Fall Board of Managers Meeting for the Texas Society, the Patriot Medal Committee announced the selection of the Patriot Medal Class for 2022. The committee selected the maximum of six compatriots, based on total number of members in the Texas Society, to receive the Patriot Medal at the Annual Meeting on March 31 through April 3, 2022.



The Patriot Medal is the highest award presented to a Compatriot by a State Society of the SAR. It recognizes long, faithful, out-

standing, and distinguished service at the state and/or chapter level. It may be received only once by a Compatriot. The Committee is comprised of Patriot Medal Recipients from around the state.

The medal is sterling silver and bears the portrait of Compatriot General of the Army Douglas MacArthur on the obverse within the inscription, "The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution." The reverse is inscribed "Awarded to (name) for Patriotic Service by the Society SAR, (year)". The medal is suspended from a chest ribbon of royal blue color. The design for the medal was selected by Compatriot General MacArthur. He received the first medal, presented posthumously at his tomb in Norfolk, Virginia, on October 19, 1964, where it is on permanent display.

# Fallen Warriors Memorial Portrait Gallery

One of the highlights of the recent Board of Managers meeting occurred during Saturday's luncheon. The Texas Society honored Ken Pridgeon for his devotion to painting portraits of fallen heroes fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan. Initially, Mr. Pridgeon started the gallery for those who were from the great state of Texas, however, he has expanded his mission to include fallen heroes who fought in Iraq and Afghanistan, and lived across the United States of America.

Mr. Pridgeon, nicknamed "The Dauber" started painting while serving in the Unites States Air Force. After leaving the military, he made a career painting billboards in Houston.

The Fallen Warriors Memorial Portrait Gallery is home to the original paintings. Mr. Pridgeon works things into the foreground that had meaning to these fallen heroes. He generously donates an 18 by 24-inch digital copy of each portrait to the fallen heroes' family.

Mr. Pridgeon has been featured on Texas Country Reporter, Fox 26 News in Houston, newspaper articles, as well as various other major news organizations.

In the gallery, the fallen heroes hang as a memorial of their unselfish gift to us all as they gave the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. They were husbands, wives, brothers, sisters, and brave warriors who laid down their lives as they took their oath to defend the freedom we all know and love.

On your next visit to Houston, be sure that a visit to the portrait gallery is on your to-do list. It is located at 13455 Cutten Road, Houston, 77069.

In addition to Mr. Pridgeon, the family of Marine Staff Sergeant Jeremy D. Smith attended the luncheon and were individually recognized and honored by President Drake Peddie for their family's sacrifice. The family members in attendance were SSgt Smith's father Jerry Smith, step-mother Julia Smith, aunt Linda Black, and uncle Danny Smith.

# LOOKING-FOR TAX~EXEMPT CONTRIBUTIONS?

As the end of 2021 approaches, you may be looking for ways to make contributions for tax purposes. Do you know that the chapter has two tax-exempt accounts that you should consider?

First, the Pray TCU Awards program was established in cooperation with the TCU History Department to recognize history students who have distinguished themselves in some patriotic fashion as set forth in the objectives of the Sons of the American Revolution Society. It is presented annually at the Spring Banquet of the TCU History Department and includes a cash award of not less than \$1,000. Candidates for the award are proposed by the TCU History Department, and final selection is made by the Chapter. The candidate must also be an American Citizen.

Second, the Goodman Youth Fund is used to assist the Chapter in administering the elementary and secondary students' programs of the Chapter. Members of the Chapter and others are encouraged to make provision in your estate planning to make contributions to the fund. The fund is also authorized to accept funds from other individuals, corporations, labor unions, businesses, and foundations. Additionally, members are encouraged to specify contributions to the Youth Fund instead of flowers as a memorial.

As of our September chapter meeting, the Pray TCU Award fund was \$1,964.53 and the Goodman Youth Fund was \$1,842.84. Both of these funds are in need of additional funds on an on-going basis.

So, if you are in search of ways to donate money at yearend for tax purposes, consider either or both of these chapter funds.

# **New Compatriots Inducted**

David Charles Fleming is the 4th great-grandson of William Snodgrass. William was born in 1760 in Frederick County, Virginia. He married Mary Elder and was the father of three known children. He died in 1849 in Sullivan County, Tennessee and is buried in Snodgrass Cemetery in Sullivan County, Tennessee.

William enlisted as a private in Virginia and served under Captains G. Adams, William Edmondson, Daisy, Lewis, Colville & Hay.

Rodney Everett Buttermore, Jr. is the 4th great-grandson of Jacob Bottomer. Jacob was born about 1758 in Germany and died in 1820 in Fayette County, Pennsylvania.

He served as a private in Captain Peter Boyers Company, German Regiment of Pennsylvania. He also served in the 2nd Regiment, German Battalion, Continental Line under Captains Daniel Burckardt, Peter Boyer, Lt. Col. Ludwick Weltner, Colonels Nicholas Houssecker and Baron Arendt.

The name of his wife is unknown; however, Jacob was the father of at least 8 known children.

Jacob is presumed to be buried in Point of Rocks Cemetery in Fayette County, Pennsylvania. A memorial marker is in Cave Hill Cemetery, Connellsville, Fayette County, Pennsylvania.

The application fee is \$60 and annual dues are \$45 plus chapter dues that will be established at the meeting in December.



#### THE MEN WHO LOST AMERICA

By Andrew Jackson O'Shaughnessy



Questioning popular belief, a historian re-examines what exactly led to the British Empire's loss of the American Revolution.

The loss of America was an unexpected defeat for the powerful British Empire. Common wisdom has held that incompetent military commanders and political leaders in Britain must have

been to blame, but were they? This intriguing book makes a different argument. Weaving together the personal stories of ten prominent men who directed the British dimension of the war, historian Andrew O'Shaughnessy dispels the incompetence myth and uncovers the real reasons that rebellious colonials were able to achieve their surprising victory.


In interlinked biographical chapters, the author follows the course of the war from the perspectives of King George III, Prime Minister Lord North, military leaders including General Burgoyne, the Earl of Sandwich, and others who, for the most part, led ably and even brilliantly. Victories were frequent, and in fact the British conquered every American city at some stage of the Revolutionary War. Yet roiling political complexities at home, combined with the fervency of the fighting Americans, proved fatal to the British war effort. The book concludes with a penetrating assessment of the years after Yorktown, when the British achieved victories against the French and Spanish, thereby keeping intact what remained of the British Empire.

### Our Lives, Our Fortunes and Our Sacred Honor: The Forging of American Independence, 1774-1776

In 1768, Philadelphia physician Benjamin Rush stood before the empty throne of King George III, overcome with emotion as he gazed at the symbol of America's connection with England. Eight years later, he became one of the fifty-six men to sign the Declaration of Independence, severing America forever from its mother country. Rush was not

alone in his radical decision -- many of those casting their votes in favor of independence did so with a combination of fear, reluctance, and even sadness.

In *Our Lives, Our Fortunes and Our Sacred Honor*, acclaimed historian Richard R. Beeman examines the grueling twenty-two-month period between the meeting of the Continental Congress on September 5, 1774 and the audacious decision for independence in July of 1776. As late as 1774, American independence was hardly inevitable -indeed, most Americans found it neither desirable nor likely. When delegates from the thirteen colonies gathered in September, they were, in the words of John Adams, "a gathering of strangers." Yet over the next two

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years, military, political, and diplomatic events catalyzed a change of unprecedented magnitude: the colonists' rejection of their British identities in favor of American ones. In arresting detail, Beeman brings to life a cast of characters, including the relentless and passionate John Adams, Adams' much-misunderstood foil John Dickinson, the fiery political activist Samuel Adams, and the relative political neophyte Thomas Jefferson, and with profound insight reveals their path from subjects of England to citizens of a new nation.

A vibrant narrative, *Our Lives, Our Fortunes and Our Sacred Honor* tells the remarkable story of how the delegates to the Continental Congress, through courage and compromise, came to dedicate themselves to the forging of American independence.



# The Swamp Fox



Francis Marion (~1732-1795) was an American guerrilla fighter in South Carolina during the Revolutionary War.

Through fables and history he gained the nickname "The Swamp Fox".

So how closely was the real Marion to Leslie Nielsen's version in Disney's "The Swamp Fox" TV series? ("And don't call me 'Francis""). Not much; the same can be said for Mel Gibson's rough comparison to Marion in "The Patriot".

A "diminutive" (meaning "short" even by 18th century standards) man, "Marion 'was small enough at birth to be put into a quart mug' and he was a frail child with badly formed knees and ankles." He was also described as that "austere little Huguenot" during his lifetime.

But as a swamp-based guerrilla fighter against the British in 1780-1781, he became a serious thorn in Cornwallis's side. Cornwallis sent his famed cavalry officer, Colonel Banastre Tarleton, out to capture Marion, but Tarleton never could. "Marion used irregular methods of warfare and is considered one of the fathers of modern guerrilla warfare and maneuver warfare, and is credited in the lineage of the United States Army Rangers and the other American military Special Forces such as the 'Green Berets'".

Like so many real characters in history, Francis Marion ("The Swamp Fox") was not the perfect, onedimensional heroes depicted by Leslie Nielsen or Mel Gibson.

The real Francis Marion was an American militia brigadier general who frustrated and terrorized British forces in South Carolina from 1780-1781.

He "used irregular methods of warfare and is considered one of the fathers of modern guerrilla warfare and maneuver warfare, and is credited in the lineage of the United States Army Rangers and the other American military Special Forces such as the 'Green Berets'".

But modern-day critics are quick to add their interpretations that Marion was also a slave-owning terrorist, and someone who persecuted the Cherokee Indians.

Other historians countered that Marion led "a ragged band of both black AND white volunteers" and that "Francis Marion was a man of his times".

In that regard, scholars say, Marion was no different than other British officers in the Southern Campaign: "...they all tortured prisoners, hanged fence-sitters, abused parole and flags of truce, and shot their own men when they failed to live up to the harsh standards they set."

So, in other words – history is complicated.

But taking it all into account, Dr. Sean Busick, professor of American history at Athens State University in Alabama, has stated that based upon the facts, "Marion deserves to be remembered as one of the heroes of the War for Independence."

Absolutely!

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
