Paul Ernest Ming

Chapter President Mike Connelley inducted and welcomed new member Paul Ernest Ming at the October 21, 2017 chapter meeting. Registrar Gerry Gieger assisted. Paul was joined by his wife, Bobby Ruth, and one of their daughters. Paul was a Law Enforcement Officer for 38 years until he retired in 1993. Paul's Patriot Ancestor was Col. William C. Whitley, 1749-1813, who served as a scout in the Revolutionary War with Gen. George Rogers Clark in the west. He was killed in the War of 1812 at the Battle of the Thames in Canada. **PAUL E. MING** passed away on June 2, 2022. He was born in El Reno, Oklahoma, on March 31, 1931, to John Clyde Ming and Juanita Mae Mills. Paul was a US Army Korean combat veteran, having served as a medic from 1948 to 1952 and attaining the rank of master sergeant. He was honored with the Soldiers Medal in addition to other awards and decorations. Paul retired as a lieutenant with the El Paso Police Department, and was also a retired park ranger at Lake Texoma State Park. Along with his much loved wife of 75 years, Bobbie, he raised four daughters, enjoyed his two grandchildren, and was pleased to welcome his first great-grandchild.

Paul enjoyed boating and camping with family and friends, traveling with Bobbie across the US in their RV, and he was an accomplished genealogy researcher. Paul and his wife lived their golden years in Fort Worth. He was a proud Mason and member of the Sons of the American Revolution. A man of honor and duty, Paul was a mentor to many and a trusted friend.

He was preceded in death by his brother and sister-inlaw, Don and Joan Ming, daughter Ruthie Ming DeLeon, and granddaughter Kathryn Ashli Murphy. He is survived by his devoted wife Bobbie; daughters P. Kathryn Murphy, Toni Skartwed, and Traci Ming; their spouses Harry Murphy and Marycarol Hennessy, John DeLeon, and David Skartwed; grandson Aaron Armand DeLeon and his wife Alexandra, and their son Ayden, who is to be joined this summer by a baby girl; nephew Don and his wife Vedia Ming. The family will celebrate Paul at a later date in a private gathering in El Reno, Oklahoma.

Can You...

NAME the 14th State of the United States?

NAME the State that wished to be the 14th State...but never did become a State?

The 14th State to enter the Union was Vermont. It was admitted on March 4, 1791.

In 1784, after the new nation won its independence, John Sevier became the governor of what some thought might become the 14th state in the United States of America. The STATE OF FRANKLIN was in the westerly portion of the colonial state of North Carolina. North Carolina tried to cede the territory to the Federal government due to reasons having to do with taxation and trouble with the cost of defending the remote area.

Congress did not accept the territory, but some citizens, among them, John Sevier, saw the benefit to the area becoming independent from North Carolina. North Carolina wasn't on board with that idea and there were a few small battles. John Sevier was elected governor of The STATE OF FRANKLIN, named for Benjamin Franklin, although Ben Franklin was in France at the time and responded to John Sevier's letter asking for support of the state, by writing back...

"I am too little acquainted with the circumstances to be able to offer you anything just now that may be of importance, since everything material that regards your welfare will doubtless have occurred to yourselves."

Ben concluded with a statesman like paragraph. "I will endeavor to inform myself more perfectly of your affairs by inquiry and searching the records of Congress and if



anything should occur to me that I think may be useful to you, you shall hear from me thereupon." (Franklin's letter to Governor John Sevier, 1787)

The STATE of FRANKLIN as the 14th state, was not to be. Sevier was then elected as Representative of North Carolina's 5th District. Soon after, North Carolina ceded again the region in the west. Franklin became part of Eastern Tennessee by 1796. John Sevier then became the first Governor of the new state of Tennessee. He also was elected as Tennessee's representative to Congress for several terms.

Van Zandt Cottage

Michael E. Patterson, a former officer of the Tarrant County Historical Society and a friend to a number of us, located these two old photos of the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Cabin/Cottage. The cabin is pictured in Photo #1 prior to it being moved and restored. In Photo #2, the fireplace is pictured as it was during the move and the restoration. Photo #3 is how the Cottage looks today.

The Cottage was built in the 1860s on the Stage Road to Weatherford, and was a haven to generations of travelers during Trinity River floods. The cabin is the only structure of its type in the City of Fort Worth that is still in its original location.

The Cottage was restored by the State of Texas during the Texas Centennial of 1936.

He is buried in the McQueen Cemetery in Johnson County. He married Hannah Duggar in 1771 in North Carolina. Chuck lives in Kellar, Texas, with his wife, Stacie Lynn *Kopp* Vanover.

Mark Smith joined the SAR based on the Patriotic Service of his 8th great-grandfather, Isaac Thomas. Isaac was a Scout and River Pilot in North Carolina and signed the Oath of Allegiance. He was born in 1735 in Virginia and died October 30, 1818, in Sevierville in Sevier County, Tennessee. He married Elizabeth Massengill on June 11, 1780. Mark lives with his wife, Monica M. *Bruce* Smith, in Bedford, Texas.

The three Davis brothers joined the SAR based on the military service of their 10th great-grandfather, Richard Ryan, Jr. Richard enlisted as a Private under Captain Joseph Duncan and was at the Siege of Savannah, the Florida Expedition, as well as several other skirmishes. Richard was born on September 3, 1756, in Orange County, North Carolina, and in 1838 in Williamson County, Tennessee. The name of his wife has not been determined. Preston, Nathan, and Austin live with their parents in North Richland Hills.

Audie Murphy Day Parade

On Saturday, June 18th, Chapter Vice President Kevin Shellman took the chapter parade trailer to Farmersville, Texas, for the 21st Annual Audie Murphy Day Parade. The trailer provided those North Texas Color Guardsmen who are unable to walk the parade route with the means of participating in the Color Guard.



Audie Murphy Day is an annual two-day celebration in Farmersville, Texas, dedicated to honoring local Veterans and active military personnel, along with hometown hero, Audie Murphy. The celebration is normally held in late June.







Farmersville hosted over 100 area veterans as the city paid tribute to them, along with its favorite sone and war hero, Audie Murphy. Following the parade, a ceremony was held featuring Patrick Baumann, a representative of Holtzwihr, a city in northeastern France. A wheel taken from the armored vehicle that Murphy attacked during the World War II fire fight that resulted in his receiving the Medal of Honor was presented during the ceremony.



First Lieutenant Audie Leon Murphy

JUNE 20, 1924 MAY 28, 1971

On the morning of July 9, 1942, nineteen days after his eighteenth birthday, Audie Murphy left home in Farmersville, Texas, hitchhiked to Greenville where he caught a bus to Dallas, and enlisted in the U.S. Army. In July 1945, he returned to Farmersville as the most decorated hero in America's history. Audie was awarded every medal for valor our country gives, including the Congressional Medal of Honor.

MEDAL OF HONOR CITATION

Rank & Organization: Second Lieutenant, U.S. Army, Company B, 15th Infantry, 3d Infantry Division

Place & Date: Near Holtzwihr, France, 26 January 1945

Entered Service: Dallas, Texas

Birth: Hunt County, near Kingston, Texas

G.O. No. 65, 9 August 1945

Citation: 2d Lt. Murphy commanded Company B, which was attacked by 6 tanks and waves of infantry. 2d Lt. Murphy ordered his men to withdraw to prepared positions in a woods, while he remained forward at his command post and continued to give fire directions to the artillery by telephone. Behind him, to his right, 1 of our tank destroyers received a direct hit and began to burn. Its crew withdrew to the woods. 2d Lt. Murphy continued to direct artillery fire which killed large numbers of the advancing enemy infantry. With the enemy tanks abreast of his position, 2d Lt. Murphy climbed on the burning tank destroyer, which was in danger of blowing up at any moment, and employed its .50 caliber machine gun against the enemy. He was alone and exposed to German fire from 3 sides, but his deadly fire killed dozens of Germans and caused their infantry attack to waver. The enemy tanks, losing infantry support, began to fall back.

For an hour the Germans tried every available weapon to eliminate 2d Lt. Murphy, but he continued to hold his position and wiped out a squad which was trying to creep up unnoticed on his right flank. Germans reached as close as 10 yards, only to be mowed down by his fire. He received a leg wound, but ignored it and continued the single-handed fight until his ammunition was exhausted. He then made his way to his company, refused medical attention, and organized his company in a counterattack which forced the Germans to withdraw. His directing of artillery fire wiped out many of the enemy; he killed or wounded about 50. 2d Lt. Murphy's indomitable courage and his refusal to give an inch of ground saved his company from possible encirclement and destruction, and enabled it to hold the woods which had been the enemy's objective.



Washington: A Life

In Washington: A Life, celebrated biographer Ron Chernow provides a richly nuanced portrait of the father of our nation. With a breadth and depth matched by no other one-volume life of Washington, this crisply paced narrative car-

A laconic man of granite self-control, he often arouses more respect than affection. In this groundbreaking work, based on massive research, Chernow dashes forever the stereotype of a stolid, unemotional man.


A strapping six feet, Washington was a celebrated horseman, elegant dancer, and tireless hunter, with a fiercely guarded emotional life. Chernow brings to vivid life a dashing, passionate man of fiery opinions and many moods. Probing his private life, he explores his fraught relationship with his crusty mother, his youthful infatuation with the married Sally Fairfax, and his often conflicted feelings toward his adopted children and grandchildren. He also provides a lavishly detailed portrait of his marriage to Martha and his complex behavior as a slave master.

At the same time, *Washington* is an astute and surprising portrait of a canny political genius who knew how to inspire people. Not only did Washington gather around himself the foremost figures of the age, including James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson, but he also brilliantly orchestrated their actions to shape the new federal government, define the separation of powers, and establish the office of the presidency.



The American's Creed
