Our April Meeting

The first month as President is a busy one and we are busy checking the items off our list. The budget for the year has been prepared and Committee Chairmen have been appointed. The Rankin Chapter once again was named Outstanding Chapter at our state convention and I look forward to our continuing this fine tradition.

The Rankin Chapter was treated to a play entitled *First Feminist*, *Second President* which focused on correspondence between the original power couple: Abigail Smith Adams, portrayed by Lynn Rice and John Adams, played by Joe Allen Rice.

The actors were attired in period dress and used items that were evocative of the time as they wrote and read letters to and from each other. They are shown in the photo below.



John and Abigail wrote over 1,100 letters to each other covering a forty year period from their courtship through John's political career. These letters, full of emotion, wit, and information, whether hidden or explicit, include observations of the Continental Congress, the weather, the farm, and the children, as well as impressions of Europe.

An example of the treats we were served is contained in this excerpt from John's letter to Abigail dated March 19, 1776, "You ask, what is thought of Common sense. Sensible Men think there are some Whims, some some Addresses Sophisms, artful superstitious Notions, some keen attempts upon the Passions, in this Pamphlet. But all agree there is a great deal of good sense, delivered in a clear, simple, concise and nervous Style." Another classic line from Abigail is "All men would be tyrants if they could. If particular care is not taken and attention is not paid to the ladies, we are determined to foment a rebellion."

It is only appropriate that that the two citizens of letters should be portrayed by two other citizens of letters. Both Joe and Lynn Rice were teachers and teach still.

Joe earned his undergraduate degree at the University of Texas, and then toured the world courtesy of the Strategic Air Command. He earned a Ph.D. in Linguistics and American Literature from Florida State University where he met Lynn. He is a Professor Emeritus of the University of Houston, and is an active speaker and published author.

for the "Sense of Duty Award." Yet book publishers are enthusiastic about biographies and treatments of our quirky second president and his strong-willed wife. There are several reasons: 1) Over a thousand letters between John and Abigail Adams have survived. 2) The Founding Fathers engaged in startling bickering and conniving as they constructed our Ship of State. John loved to tattle about it. 3) He was a one-term president. But he and Abigail produced another president. 4) Abigail is finally taking her rightful place as America's First Feminist."

Remember the Ladies,

2001, 66 pages, Carolrhoda Press. Jerri Chase Ferris aims this booklet at teenage girls. It is a charming mix of fact and fiction.

The Wisdom of John and Abigail Adams, 2002, by R. B. Bernstein, 138 pages, Fall River Press. Stress on "the lively richness of John Adams's political thought." Abigail gets credit as his most trusted political advisor.

The Letters of John and Abigail Adams, 2004, 470 pages, Penguin Classics. Editor Frank Shuffelton calls this book "an intimate portrait of a colonial family and a historical record of an emerging America."

My Dearest Friend,

2007, 500 pages, edited by Margaret Hogan and James Taylor. When they were young, John addressed his letters to "Miss Adorable." And later both used "My Dearest Friend." This book from Harvard University Press includes letters that have been recently uncovered.

Abigail Adams,

2009, 480 pages, Free Press. A reviewer says, "This is not your father's Abigail Adams."

The Quotable Abigail Adams,

2009, 400 pages, Harvard University Press. It's pithy and fun to page through.
