

December Thoughts by Thomas Jackson, Editor

When I was in church this past Sunday, the lyrics sung by the choir struck a chord within me, not only for the intended meaning, but also because the lyrics surely described that winter encampment of Valley Forge. Washington's army occupied this area from December 19, 1777 to June 19, 1778. The cantata, *Winter's Grace*, from renowned composer Joseph M. Martin included the following lyrics:

In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan. Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone. Snow had fallen snow on snow, snow on snow.

... It is winter now.

The falling snow has left the heavens clear. Through leafless boughs the sharp winds blow. All the earth lies dead and drear...

As we know however, Valley Forge was not the end of the Continental Army, but rather an important maturation process. Friedrich Wilhelm von Steuben, a former member of the general staff of Frederick the Great, arrived in Valley Forge with a letter of introduction from Ben Franklin. Von Steuben offered his military skills and commenced training the army. Others provided leadership and training as well. Hamilton and Burr were both present, as were the future President Monroe and future Chief Justice Marshall. Frenchmen Lafayette and Duportail were joined by the French trained German DeKalb. Knox, Greene, and Wayne were also there.

The Beginning of the Program

From a speech delivered by President General Judge Ed Butler on November 10, 2009:

"Shortly after being inducted as President General, I started a test program, which I termed the "SAR Wounded Warrior Program". Twelve of us participating in the Pacific International Conference in Honolulu in September, met with a dozen soldiers, sailors and airmen at Tripler Army Hospital, who suffered from severe traumatic stress disorder. We told them how much the SAR appreciated their service and sacrifice. As we presented them with SAR Outstanding Citizenship Award pins, we took their photo. Their photo, a copy of their SAR Certificate and a news release was shipped to their hometown newspaper, and the certificate was mailed to them. This event started with blank stares and ended with smiling faces and celebration."



World War II Army Veteran Bill McKenna was the guest speaker at October meeting of the Thomas Jefferson Chapter of the California State Society. Bill, a friend of Rankin Chapter Compatriot Douglas Thornton, spoke of his experiences at Corregidor. In a joint presentation of the Rankin and Jefferson Chapters, Bill was presented with the Wounded Warrior Coin and Certificate. Bill noted in an email, "Yes, I received a purple heart for scrapes and bumps received on Corregidor on the night the Japs tried to blow up Malinta Hill. I was so lucky to escape with minor wounds. I was just ten yards away from where six members of my platoon were buried alive. I am not familiar with Sons of the American Revolution, but I would be honored to have one of their medals.

Ask the Editor:

Each year with the changing of the guard, certain questions are routinely asked. Those questions and the answers by the editor are shown below.

Where do the photos come from?

Photos are submitted by Compatriots to both the Historian and the Newsletter Editor. Of course, the Historian and Editor will journey with their cameras to take photos and they will exchange images.

What is the source of the articles? Who writes them?

As with any small newsletter, the reporter is also the editor. Articles are generally not submitted and the editor/reporter must be vigilant in contacting compatriots for newsworthy items to mention.

How long does the Newsletter take to write and publish?

As might be expected, each issue requires a different amount of time. On average, the editor devotes a minimum of four hours to one side of a page. That includes collecting the photos, the facts, drafting, correcting, and publishing. This year, seventy-six newsletter pages consumed over three hundred hours.

The above time estimate includes neither time for the Copy Editors, Gus and Bernice Mistrot, to review the copy nor our Webmaster, Ray Cox, to post the issue on the website. Also excluded from the estimate is the time to send by snail mail to our members who require that service.
