This Day in History



President Bruce McMordie (above) presents. On this day in history, December 16, 1773, the **Boston Tea Party** takes place when a group of angry patriots dump the tea from three ships into Boston Harbor to protest Parliament's tax on tea. In 1767, the **Townshend Acts** placed a tax on tea and other items for the first time, leading to boycotts of English goods in the colonies. The **Townshend Acts** were finally repealed in 1770, except for the tea tax, which Parliament left in place to assert that it did indeed have the right to tax the colonists.

Samuel Adams and several dozen men, some dressed as Mohawk Indians, marched to Griffin's Wharf and boarded the ships. 42 tons of tea from all three ships was dumped into the harbor, so much that the water of Boston Harbor was reportedly brown for a week! The dumping of the tea on this date was important because it meant the tea could not be resold to pay the taxes.
