

After the surrender of General Charles Cornwallis' army at Yorktown, Virginia in October 1781, many members of Parliament decided it was time to end the war. The House of Commons first voted to end the war on February 27, 1782 and in March, Prime Minister North resigned. By April 4, General Henry Clinton was replaced as Commander of British forces in North America by Sir Guy Carleton, who was charged with implementing a withdrawal. Informal peace negotiations began in April in Paris between Ben Franklin and Richard Oswald, the representative of the new Prime Minister, Charles Watson Wentworth, and the Marquess of Rockingham.

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
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


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

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Main Speaker



J. Kent McGaughy

Kent McGaughy (pronounced Ma-goy) is a professor of history at the Katy Campus of Houston Community College where he has taught now for 21 years. He is an Associate Chair for the Department of History and teaches a variety of courses, including a survey on Revolutionary America.

He received his B.A. in history from the University of Texas at Austin and his M.A. and Ph.D. in history from the University of Houston. In addition to writing *Richard Henry Lee of Virginia: A Portrait of an American Revolutionary*, he has published articles in *New York History*, and *The Encyclopedia of Conspiracy Theories* and has also appeared on C-Span's *Washington Journal* to discuss Richard Henry Lee as one of America's forgotten founding fathers. He is currently completing a book manuscript that shares the same title as tonight's presentation: "George Washington and the Forgotten History of the American Revolution."



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
