Family Tree DNA offers analysis of autosomal DNA, YDNA, and mtDNA to individuals for genealogical purposes based on DNA samples collected using a cheek swab method with a kit supplied by Family Tree DNA to its customers.

In February 2009, Family Tree DNA announced that they, in partnership with the

National Geographic Genographic Project, have tested over 500,000 kits.

The Battle of Medina

On August 20, 2011 on the old Applewhite Road in Atascosa County, the William Hightower Chapter #35 of the TXSSAR sponsored a patriot grave marking ceremony to commemorate the 198th anniversary of the Battle of Medina. Overlooking the Galvan Creek is where it is believed between 800 and 1,300 men died August 18, 1813. This was the bloodiest and largest loss of life of any battle in Texas history, and it occurred about 20 miles south of San Antonio, Texas.

"Contrary to popular belief, the struggle for democracy in Texas did not begin with the Anglo-led revolution of 1835-36," author and historian James Haley wrote in a recent *Austin American-Statesman* article. The Battle at Medina was a precursor to independence.

Numerous societies have joined to remember ancestors who died in this battle. The TXSSAR will rededicate their marker to American Revolutionary Patriot Peter Sides, the Sons of The Republic of Texas marker for Benjamin Allen, the Mayflower Society marker for Samuel Adams and all the other men who fought and died in this battle.

The SAR, DAR, SRT, DRT, The Daughters of the War of 1812 Society, and the Mayflower Societies will all re-dedicate their markers, making this one of the most honored and dedicated historic sites in Texas.

Thomas Green served as the Master of Ceremonies and is a Knight of San Jacinto and a Past President of TXSSAR. Tom Green, shown in the photo below dressed in revolutionary garb, "The Battle of Medina was between the Republican Army of the North consisting of approximately a 1,400 men, called the Gutierrez-Magee Expedition by historians, and a Royal Spanish Army Joaquin commanded by General Arredondo consisting of approximately 1,800 men. The Republican Army of the North flew an emerald green battle flag.

The Republican Army of the North was truly a diverse group, consisting of Tejanos, Native Americans, and adventurers from the U.S.A. with at least one African-American named Thomas. This was at a time in history when only about 2,000 people lived in San Antonio, called San Fernando de Bexar at the time.

At least five Patriots of the American Revolution were involved in the Gutierrez-Magee Expedition, and at least one of these Patriots fought and died in the Battle of Peter Sides is one of over 50 Medina. **Patriots** of the American Revolution believed to have been buried in Texas."





ceremony.

The Gutierrez-Magee Expedition formed the Republican Army of the North, and won all the preceding battles and declared Texas free from Spain, including a battle at Nacogdoches, a four-month siege of the Presidio La Bahia, the Battle of Rosillo, and the Battle of Alazan. The Republic of Texas ended with the Battle of Medina on August 18, 1813. After the battle, the Royalist Army went to San Antonio and imprisoned many of the residents of the city.
