In a letter to George Washington dated August 1st, 1775, Elbridge Gerry, struggling at the Siege of Boston, begged for gunpowder. To George Washington's "very great astonishment" he said he was down to only 36 barrels. Washington could have sworn that Gerry had 308 barrels.

Washington had asked the Committee of Supplies how much gunpowder they had. The Committee of Supplies, "not being sufficiently acquainted with the nature of a return (message) sent in an account of all the ammunition which had been collected, so that the report included not only gunpowder on hand, but what had been spent."

Washington banged his head against the wall . . . so to speak.

Gerry survived and went on to be James Madison's Vice President.

On June 6, 2009 the 23rd Annual AIA SandCastle Competition was held at East Beach, Galveston. This year over 80 teams comprised of architects, contractors, designers, university students, and engineers engaged in sand sculpting for what is considered one of the world's largest sandcastle competitions.
