TWO SAN ANTONIO CHAPTER MEMBERS WIN DAR'S HIGHEST AWARD

The San Antonio de Bexar chapter of the DAR announced on Dec. 4, 2001, that John Delavan Baines, had been selected to receive the 2021 DAR Medal of Honor. It is given to an adult man or woman who is a United States citizen by birth and has shown extraordinary qualities of leadership, trustworthiness, service, and patriotism.



Since its creation in 1972, the most prestigious honor awarded by the National DAR Society has been presented to fewer than 2,000 individuals across the United States and overseas. There is only one award each year. The DAR has about 3,000 chapters worldwide, and each is authorized to nominate an individual. It is a credit to the San Antonio de Bexar DAR chapter that two of their nominees have won this award in the past four years - some might say amazing, as Judge Ed Butler, President General of the SAR in 2009-2010 was the winner in 2017.

What is even more amazing is that John Bains and Judge Ed Butler are both members of Texas SAR. It is incredible that both Medal of Honor winners are members of the San Antonio Chapter SAR. It would take a mathematician to compute the odds of that happening again.

John will be presented his medal and certificate at the Texas DAR annual convention in March 2022.


Patriot Medal Awardees Announced for 2022

ichael J. Bailey - Faithful member since 2008, Michael has actively served as Cradle


of Texas Chapter SAR President for three terms 2013-2015, 2012 Chapter #33 Vice President, 2011 Chapter Secretary, and has also served as Chapter Historian, Chapter Chaplain, and member of the Chapter Color Guard for over six



years. Michael has passionately served as Chapter Newsletter editor and publisher for 10 years. His dedication to the community and DAR outreach has been proven with seven historical presentations at area museums and DAR chapter in 2018 and 2019 alone. His continued service includes attending meetings in full Militia uniform, manning the SAR recruitment booth at the Annual Brazoria Heritage Day Celebration for the past five years, as well as helping out when needed on short notice. TEXAS FREEDOM CHAPTER HOSTS

WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA CEREMONIES IN MONTGOMERY TEXAS

The members of the Texas Freedom Chapter Sons of the American Revolution hosted a wonderful Wreaths Across America Ceremony on Sunday, December 19, 2021, in Montgomery, Texas - "The Birthplace of the Texas Flag." Originally planned for December 18th, which is the nationwide weekend "to remember and honor veterans" by laying wreaths on the graves of the country's fallen heroes and Patriots, the ceremonies were postponed until Sunday, when a downpour of rain and thunderstorms prevented the groups from having the ceremony on Saturday.

The vision to have the Wreaths across America Ceremonies at the New Cemetery in Montgomery, Texas, was that of David Hamaker of the Texas Freedom Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution. The SAR Freedom Chapter members who led the ceremonies were John Meredith, Ed Sellards, Loren Johnston, Dave Underdown, Tom Stuewe, John Thompson, and David Hamaker. Hamaker introduced and thanked Montgomery Mayor Sara Countryman for her efforts in making the Wreaths across America ceremonies happen for the first time at the New Montgomery Cemetery in Montgomery and she was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Sons of the American Revolution. David Hamaker thanked

Dean Bass of the Spirit of Texas Bank for donating the hundreds of Wreaths which were placed on the graves. The Color Guard was provided by Montgomery High School JROTC, Maj. Erik Sharpe, Sr. Marine instructor. Randall Moore, Scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop 491, and his scouts marched in with the Honor guard and provided assistance all day in the laying of the wreaths.

The goal of the nationwide ceremonies is to remember and honor veterans through the laying of Wreaths on the graves of the country's fallen heroes. With the laying of the wreaths, each person or group laying a wreath was asked to "Say the name of each Veteran aloud" as they honored their memory.

The numerous groups who were part of the Wreath Laying ceremonies were members of the Sons of the American Revolution, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (Heritage Trails Chapter, Coushatti Trace Chapter, and Spring Creek Chapter), the Daughters of the Republic of Texas (Judge Nathaniel Hart Davis Chapter), the United Daughters of the Confederacy (Thomas Jefferson Stubbs Chapter and Rebel Joan of Arc Chapter), the United Daughters of the Confederacy; the Sons of the Republic of Texas (Lone Star Chapter), the Sons of Confederate Veterans, and Students from Montgomery High School, Junior High School, and Elemen-

tary school, along with the Boys Scouts and JROTC cadets who were all part of the Wreath laying ceremonies honoring their ancestors buried in the cemetery. David Hamaker introduced Pat Spackey, descendant of Texas Patriot Dr. Charles B. Stewart, and the honorable Sara Countryman, Mayor of Montgomery, to lay the first wreaths in the cemetery. During Wreaths Across America Day across the Country, more than 2,500 cemeteries took part in honoring these men and women who have served our country. It was a beautiful day in Montgomery, Texas!



William Hightower Awards EMS Medal

During the Blanco County Commissioners Court in Johnson City on Tuesday, January 11, 2022, the William Hightower Chapter, Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), honored Blanco County Emergency Medical Service's EMS Chief Ben Oakley with the SAR Emergency Medical Services Commendation certificate and medal.

This commendation is presented to an individual for accomplishments and/or outstanding contribution in the area of emergency medical services for performing an act or service beyond what is normally expected during the course of their duties.

Chief Oakley was highly recommended by Blanco County Judge Brett Bray.

In addition to directly saving many lives in his role, other highlights of this recommendation was Oakley's outstanding management of two EMS districts by staffing and procurement of state-of-the-art equipment for the benefit of Blanco County residents and visitors. As a member of the Blanco County Incident Command System, Oakley excelled in his role of Incident Commander during the 2015 Memorial Day Flood. Oakley has also participated in the Texas costal hurricane rescue operations. As a vital member of the Blanco County Emergency Management Team, his advice and counsel are relied on to the benefit of all of Blanco County.

A certificate of award and medal with bar was presented by Blanco county resident Blair Rudy. Rudy is the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Color Guard Commander.

He was assisted by Robert Duckworth, Chief Ben Oakley, Judge Brett Bray, Eric Mowles, and Kris Krueger of the William Hightower Chapter in New Braunfels, Texas.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR PATRIOTS Buried in TEXAS

Compatriots:

An on-going project for the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is the marking of ALL the graves of the patriots from the American Revolution who are buried in Texas. Only about 24 have been marked and not all by the SAR. Other organizations, like the DAR, DRT, and SRT, have marked some of the graves. My research revealed that the last Revolutionary War Patriots grave to be marked was that of Benjamin W. Anderson in the Glenfawn Cemetery near Glenfawn in East Texas. It was done by the Athens Chapter SAR on 24 November 2018. Bill Sekel conducted the program and the Edmund Terrill Chapter SAR provided the Color Guard. We also had Clayton Starr, a member of the SRT James George Chapter, talk about Benjamin enlisting in the local militia during the Texas Revolution at 85 years of age. He may be the only person to have fought in both revolutions. On a lighter note, he had a love for race horses and often rode them himself. At the age of 96, he fell off of one



and broke his leg in a race. Stories of this type you would never know unless you did research or attended the dedication.

When you locate the information on the Texas web site under "Who are we," you will find "Texas SAR Revolutionary War Patriot Grave Markings Project." The second paragraph goes into details as to what needs to be accomplished when marking a grave. I have been searching the Internet and local libraries for information on these patriots. The biggest draw back is that many of those needing to be marked are in East Texas. Granted some of the graves cannot be marked as they are on private property or the grave has not been located. Still, that does not mean that we should overlook them, but collect information on their lives when we can. It would allow the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution to have a more complete picture of the Revolutionary War Patriots from those who fought for the independence of a free nation.

You ask what can you do! We need some champions to take on one or two of these grave markings. Ask your chapter to join you in completing this work. By doing this we would be working on an on-going project that the Texas SAR has allowed to lapse. Part of this is because those who started it are no longer with us or cannot get out. We need to finish this great project before our 250th Anniversary of Independence occurs. Reach out to the DAR Chapters for additional help. Additionally, a good bio of the patriot, plus pictures of the marking and a program are needed, if available. These would be placed in the Texas SAR archives and history.

What are the benefits for you or your chapter? These marking are all National Events. There is a section on the Stark report for recording them. Color Guardsmen can count points toward National medals, plus you can count miles. They are open to all members of the SAR. Let's not forget that other organizations may want to join you and place their own marker on these graves. Who among you would like to work or organize one of these projects? 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Compatriot Speaks on His Virginia Long Rifle

Compatriot Bob Jacobs spoke at the January meeting of the Maj. K.M. Van Zandt Chapter SAR about his newly built Virginia Long Rifle, for which the personal significance is that it's likely similar to what his Patriot ancestors would have carried. Perhaps in battle, but certainly to put food on the table. Samuel Jacobs (P-223912) was born in 1760 in Hampshire County, Virginia (now West Virginia) on the western slope of the Appalachians abutting the Proclamation Line of 1763. Samuel's father, William Jacobs, is presumed to have moved from the Chesapeake Bay region (where the Jacobs had lived for several generations) to Hampshire as the result of his service in the French and Indian War. William Jacobs (P-341202) would later serve as a Lieutenant in the Virginia Militia under Col. Henry Lee.

Bob's rifle is modeled after French and Indian War/early Revolutionary War era long rifles. It was built by Thom Frazier, an artisan gun maker in Minnesota, using a tiger maple stock, a 44" Rice swamped .54 caliber barrel, and a Jim Chamber's "Deluxe Large" Siler lock replicating an American forged lock of the period (the vast majority of locks were imported from England). Bob hopes to take a deer and/or turkey, to make Samuel and William proud, before relegating it to Color Guard duty and a permanent place of honor adorning his office wall.



Lt. Gen. John Wright, Jr.

John McNair Wright, Jr. was born in Los Angeles, California, on April 14, 1916. He enlisted in the Regular Army in 1935. He entered the U. S. Military Academy in 1936 and graduated from West Point in 1940.



CORREGIDOR

The White flag went up at noon. The war was over for the men on Corregidor. Three hours before noon on May 6, 1942, orders were issued to demolish all equipment. When the surrender flag was raised, Corregidor was a silent, battered wreck. No longer was it a strongly forti-



fied island. Relentless Japanese air and artillery bombardment had reduced it to a white, dusty rock.

As John wrote in his diary, "We did not know at noon on May 6, 1942, that we were starting down a road to Hell. We did not know that many of us would plumb the depths of the bottomless pit and look death in the eye and that only one out

of three prisoners of war would make the road back."

Through three and one half years they were POW's. Knowing how the Japs would love to have a West Point ring, John sewed his into the crotch of his drawers. Later, he sewed it into the cuffs of his trousers. When they were moved to Korea, the ship was bombed nine times by the Allied forces. The ninth time a major hole was opened and the ship was so damaged she was run to ground. John had to swim ashore and when they reached the beach, they were rounded up by Japanese Marines. When the end of the war came, rations were air lifted to the camps. As multi-colored parachutes dropped supplies, they sewed an American Flag out of red white and blue parachutes. On September 6, 1945, at the most impressive flag raising ceremony any of them had ever witnessed, they were again under the American Flag.



POST-WAR

John spent a year in the Hospital and from his diary that he had kept, he wrote **Captured on Corregidor: Diary of an American P.O.W. in World War II**.

John spent several years in Washington, D. C., and on November 1, 1948, he became a Major and a Military Attaché at the Embassy of the United States in Paraguay for a year.

He was a staff Officer of the 7th Infantry Division in Korea, then Colonel Chief of Staff 8th Infantry Division in Germany. In 1964, he became Assistant Division Commander Brigadier General at Ft Benning, Georgia, 11th Air Assault Division, where he took a Helicopter Course and was designated a U S Army



Aviator and deployed to Vietnam.

VIETNAM

In 1965, he was the Assistant Division Commander 1st Calvary Division in Vietnam where he was in charge of setting up a base camp. The 1,030 officers and men tasked with building the camp began their work. Wright directed that they plant grass on the ground they had cleared for the heliport. He believed that "each blade of grass was going to help in keeping down the dust, thus minimizing the maintenance problems that we would have on the helicopters as well as the wear on the rotor blades." He even ordered those working on the field to avoid scuffing the area with their boots, going so far as to declare that anyone who did would have to work in his bare feet. His exhortations to make the area "look exactly like a fine golf course" gave the heliport its nickname-"the Golf Course." He started flying rescue missions.

He went back to Ft Benning Georgia, as a Major General for more training at Infantry school.

In May 1969, he was the Major General Commanding the 101st Airborne Division - The Screaming Eagles. He was again flying rescue missions. For his leadership, he was awarded his second Distinguished Service Medal, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and 47 Air Medals.

POST-VIETNAM

After his second tour, he was promoted to Lt. General and transferred to the Pentagon as Controller of the Army.

John had moved to Irving, Texas, and made application to join the SAR. His application was approved October 5, 1981, and became the Dallas Chapter President in 1985.

In 1987/88, General Wright was President of the Texas Society. At the 97th Annual Congress in Pennsylvania in 1987, Lt. General John McNair Wright was almost exhausted by the time Recognition Night drew to a close for he came from the audience to accept **nine** major awards on behalf of his society. At the 98th annual Congress in Virginia when the results were revealed, the Texas SAR walked off with the most honors – as it did last year. Texas also became the largest Society with 2020 members.

I became friends with Former State President David Peterson and I asked him if he knew General Wright. Yes, he met him in Korea as they were both in the 7th Infantry Division. David had high regards for General Wright.

John moved back to Los Angeles and was President of the Boy Scouts. John died January 27, 2014, and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery. In December 2019, I contacted Past President General Joe Dooley to see if I could get a picture of General Wright's grave with a Wreath placed on it.

Ernie Coggins, Past President of the George Washington Chapter, Virginia Society, was kind enough to find his grave and send me pictures.

A New Texas Chapter Ark-La-Tex #69

He soon found there were others that had the same interest as he did and they got with the local Daughters of the American Revolution who helped them get a chapter established. There are a number of Revolutionary War Patriots buried in East Texas and their graves need to be found and marked.

The Athens Chapter donated flags to the new chapter and other chapters made a cash donation to them. They being: Dallas, Plano, East Fork Trinity, and Ambassador Fletcher Warren. John Greer spoke about many of the Veterans activities and presented a 50th Vietnam medal to one individual. TXSSAR? NO! NO!

From the SAR Brand Identity Guide -

Brand fragmentation is a very serious problem that affects public recognition of SAR. Say "DAR" and nearly everyone, including the nonmember public knows that DAR is synonymous with Patriotism, Citizenship, and the Revolutionary War. Say "SAR" and not so many make the connection. Part of the reason is because too many letters are used in our abbreviations. For example, NSSAR, TXSSAR, TNSSAR, DESSAR, VTSSAR, KSS-SAR and ALSSAR. Would not SAR, Texas SAR, Tennessee SAR, Delaware SAR, Vermont SAR, Kansas SAR, and Alabama SAR serve as a better identity than the alphabet soup currently used? The identity of SAR is clear in the examples and demonstrates an obvious connection between the national, district, state, and chapters. The Guide recommends adoption of the revised identification protocol and that SAR HQ urge districts, states, and chapters to conform over the next two years. The Guide recommends each state to consider how they can take advantage of using the name of their state spelled out, abbreviated, eliminate the "Society" (synonymous with state) and use "SAR" for identity. Similarly, Districts and Chapters are requested to follow the example of national and states, using naming patterns such as Southern District SAR, Western District SAR, Andrew Jackson Chapter SAR, Birmingham Chapter SAR, George Washington Chapter SAR, George Mason Chapter SAR, etc.

The policy of the editor of this newsletter is to replace any reference to TXSSAR with Texas Society or Texas SAR. When writing articles for publication, please do not use TXSSAR.

Dr. James Jefferson Johnson, Jr.

Another longtime member of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution has passed into Eternity.


Dr. James Jefferson Johnson, Jr., a retired art professor, died on 19 Jan 2022 in Denton, Texas. Jim's application to become a member of the SAR and the Denton Chapter was registered on 15 Jun 1995.


Jim was born 23 Mar 1935 in Sweetwater, Texas, the son of James Jefferson Johnson, Sr., and Ann Ellen Camp. He married Mary Lynn Miller on 17 Aug 1957 in Midland, Texas. He was the father of Melinda Ann Johnson Foster and James Jefferson Johnson, III.

Jim was a very active member of the SAR over the years. He participated in the Color Guard and as an artist, provided many sketches of SAR personages over the years. He was often seen at meetings with pen and sketchbook in hand. His sketchbooks were done between 1975 and 2002 and includes sketches of friends, family, personal events, travel, demonstrations of techniques for students,



events occurring on the North Texas State University (University of North Texas) campus, events related to the Sons of the American Revolution (Local, State, and National), sketches and notes of committee meetings for university meetings and for meetings of the Denton Greater Arts Council and the North Texas Area Art League, and from worship services.





His sketchbooks also included notes, drawings, collage, preparatory work for other artworks and publications, etc. His artwork was done in pen, pencil, watercolor, colored inks, etc. The sketchbooks total 25 volumes and are arranged in chronological order in the Library at the University of North Texas in Denton.

The Texas Regimental Cockade was designed by Jim and Mary Lynn Johnson of the Denton Chapter #23, Texas SAR. Mary Lynn makes the cockade entirely by hand and they are pin backed with a safety catch so they may be easily attached to hat or lapel.

Dr. Johnson received a Bachelor of Art and Education at West Texas State University, where he met his wife, Dr. Mary Lynn Johnson. He received a Master's Degree at University of Texas, El Paso, and a Ph.D. in Art Education from Pennsylvania State University. He joined the art faculty at North Texas State University in 1968, where he taught until 1995.

Jim was an active member of the Denton Community Theater, the North Texas Art League, the Greater Denton Arts Council, the Denton Historical Commission, and the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Initiated by Compatriot Jim Johnson, the Texas SAR began archiving documents at the University of North Texas in late December 2003.

HOW TO EARN MEDALS

The Texas SAR private website has updated information on how to earn Color Guard medals. This is an important update and you are encouraged to read it.

The Color Guard Commanders and Staff will update the Color Guard Manual prior to the State Conference.

There are two kinds of Color Guard medals: Texas State Bernardo de Galvez and National Color Guard.

The Texas SAR Color Guard Bernardo de Galvez Medal program tracks types of events to earn recognition.

The National Color Guard Medal program uses a combination of types of events and points accrued. In addition to points for an event, it includes miles traveled points for the total points.

Maintain a uniformed Color Guard participation log for Texas and National medals. Texas Bernardo de Galvez Medals are Bronze, Silver, and Gold. The application form is found on the Texas SAR private website under the **Reports/Forms** menu, the **Color Guard** tab, and then **Color Guard Reporting Form**. National Color Guard Medals are also Bronze, Silver, and Gold. Texas uses the point method to apply for National Color Guard Medals. This program is more complicated than the Texas SAR Bernardo de Galvez program. Be sure to review the National Color Guard Handbook and obtain the form on the NSSAR website under **Members** > **Committees** > **Color Guard**.

Van Zandt Awards Heroism & Life Saving Medals to FWPD

On August 23, 2021, at 0222 hours, Sgt. Benjamin Bucy of the Fort Worth Police Department received a phone call from Off-Duty Officer Damon Johnson stating that he just witnessed a car accident at the new roundabout located at White Settlement Road and Commercial Street. Officer Johnson stated that the car flipped over and was now on fire and requested on-duty officers' assistance. Sgt. Bucy then relayed the information over the radio requesting all West 7th units with fire extinguishers to respond. He arrived on scene and could not immediately locate the vehicle. He drove around the roundabout until he was flagged down by Officer Johnson. Officer Johnson then pointed to where the vehicle was, which was approximately 150 feet off the roadway and down a hill, making it impossible to see from the street. Sgt. Bucy exited his vehicle and retrieved his fire extinguisher. He then approached the edge of the hill and was able to see down to where the vehicle was located. The vehicle had fire coming out of the hood and was on its side, making it so no one could get out of the vehicle. Officer Jonathan Stephens, Officer Carlos Almaraz, and Officer Nicholas Wenzel had now arrived on scene as well and also retrieved their fire extinguishers. Sgt. Bucy, Officer Stephens, Officer Almaraz, and Officer Wenzel all ran towards the burning vehicle. As the Officers approached the vehicle, they could hear screaming coming from inside the car as it was filling up with smoke. Sgt. Bucy and Officer Stephens then used the fire extinguishers to put out the fire which was growing larger by the second. Officers Wenzel and Almaraz, and now Officers Timothy Arrington and Rachel Warren, tried to bust the windshield of the vehicle to get the trapped and seriously injured women out of the burning car as they screamed for help. Once the fire was put out, Sgt. Bucy went to assist with getting the trapped people out of the car before the car caught on fire again. Seeing that the rescue of the passengers was not going well, he suggested pushing the vehicle over on to its wheels so the group of Officers could try to get the people out through the doors. All Officers on scene then assisted in pushing the vehicle back over on to its wheels. Once the vehicle was on its wheels, the Officers discovered that the doors were locked from the

inside. Officers then had to bust windows to the vehicle to be able to open the car doors. Once the doors were opened, the Officers were able to drag the two trapped passengers to safety. If it were not for the quick reaction by Officer Johnson to call Sgt. Bucy for assistance and the quick and brave actions of all responding officers placing themselves in harm's way, Sgt. Bucy stated, "I am sure that those human lives would have been lost to the fire of that vehicle. These actions of duty, honor and commitment reflects credit upon all of the officers, the Fort Worth Police Department, and the City of Fort Worth."

On Tuesday afternoon, February 22, 2022, a group of chapter officers traveled to the Fort Worth Police Department headquarters to recognize this group of officers for their heroism and life-saving efforts.

Chapter President Bobby Gresham, assisted by Mike Connelley and Ron Turner, presented the SAR Heroism Medal and Certificate to Sgt. Benjamin Bucy, Officer Damon Johnson, and Officer Jonathan Stephens. They presented the SAR Life Saving Medal and Certificate to Officer Carlos Almarez, Officer Nicholas Wenzel, Officer Timothy Arrington, and Officer Rachel Warren.

Compatriots in attendance included: President Bobby Gresham, Immediate Past President Ron Turner, Past President Gerry Gieger, Past President Mike Connelley, Color Guard Commander Vann Cunningham, and FWPD Lt. David Fleming.

The Chairman will file the newsletters and use them when time to evaluate them. The evaluation will occur in February of each year to determine the winning chapters in each category.

Announcement and awards are presented during the state annual convention.

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How to Submit Items to The Texas Compatriot

The Texas Compatriot welcomes submissions from compatriots. Here are some tips on getting your story published.

- Keep your article as short as you can while still telling the story. Send stories in Microsoft Word format to compatriot@txssar.org.
- Send digital photographs as attachments and not embedded into the Word document. They also should be sent to compatriot@txssar.org.
- 3. Make sure your images are high resolution, at least 300 DPI, and that no time or date stamps appear on the images.
- 4. Limit the number of photographs to those you would most like to see published.
- Meet the deadlines published for and in each issue.

New Picture Policy

To publish photos of children under the age of 18 in *The Texas Compatriot*, your local chapter newsletter, or on your chapter website, you must have a signed parental form that gives us (the Texas Society SAR) permission to publish the child's name and photo. You can find the form on the Society's public website under **Contest/Programs** > **Permission/Release Form**.
