### War on the Run by John F. Ross

This book is about the life and military career of Robert Rogers, the man generally credited with the development of the military concept of "Rangers, Special Forces, DELTA, etc." groups. Small, mobile, independent, efficient and deadly. Most of the action is set in the era of the French and Indian Wars when Rogers' career began.

It is not a long book and is, in my opinion, fast moving. He was a contemporary of George Washington. Rogers is the guy that that you went

to when you needed something done, especially if that "thing" was dangerous, difficult or deadly. His way of fighting and moving through the countryside was right out of the playbook of the Native American Tribes of the mid-1700s.

I found it to be a good book and difficult to put down, especially in the chapters when he and his men roamed the New England territory during the French and Indian War.

Speaking of books. I am thinking about the chapter having another "Book silent auction" like we did at some point in 2021. The idea is to bring in some history / biographic books and donate them to the chapter to put up for sale on a silent auction format. ## The American Revolution Podcast by Michael Troy

A Chronological Journey Through the Revolutionary War

The American Revolution Podcast is a free collection of 244 (so far) episodes of events that comprise the American Revolution and the people that influenced those events. Each episode is about 25 minutes, plus the author and narrator Michael Troy includes a short sequel to each episode with book recommendations pertaining to that particular episode. Many of these book recommendations are "on-line" books, with many from the free website Archive.org, and include the original book or pamphlet written in the 1700's.

The author/host, Michael Troy is an attorney, by education and experience, but later developed an interest in information technology. He currently works as an IT Manager for a Philadelphia law firm and says that he developed an interest in history, especially Revolutionary War history, during the bicentennial of the United States.

This podcast is my first adventure into podcasts on the Revolutionary War, and I intend to use it as a ready reference to specific events and time periods of the Revolution. It is that well organized.

The American Revolution Podcast episodes were published by Troy over a period of about four years, with a new episode released every week. I don't know how he has the time to research each episode, write a script for each episode, record each episode, and still have time to spend time with his family, work, and keep the seemingly never-ending things done around the house.

Episodes are broken down into groups that include the 1754-1764 period of the French and Indian War to set the background, the beginning of the War in 1775, 1776, the British Offensives of 1777, the French Alliance in 1778, and the War in 1779, so far. Each episode includes a written text of the episode on the website (<a href="https://blog.AmRevPodcast.com">https://blog.AmRevPodcast.com</a>), as well as in the podcast itself. Included on the website and podcast are maps and pictures that support the events of that particular episode, as well as on-line links to recommended sources.

As some of you may know, our Registrar Tom Richards and I are working on a class-room presentation of the ride of William Dawes and Paul Revere. Tom is a descendent of Dawes and has in-depth knowledge from family sources and obscure historical documents. I, on the other had, find that *The American Revolution Podcast* is a great source of information, well-suited to this project. See episodes 53, 54, 55, and 56.

I also developed an interest in the Battle of Bunker Hill from *The American Revolution Podcast* because my early research of my wife's family indicated that her ancestor Andrew McClary had fought at that battle. Andrew McClary was in fact a patriot of some note for his valor at Bunker Hill, and his final moments in life are depicted in John Trumbull's 1786 painting of the battle. Unfortunately, additional research revealed that my wife's Andrew McClary was a patriot militiaman, but not that Andrew McClary.

In addition to Troy's well-researched podcast, I like this podcast because of the 25-35 minute format, that matches up nicely with my 40 minutes walk each morning. At just over 2.5 miles covered during each of those walks, and considering that I have about 123 episodes left, I have just over 307 miles to go!

The meeting was held at the Emily Fowler Library in Denton, Texas.

**Chapter Treasurer Chris Strauss** stated the current balance as of 12/31/2021 in the checking account is \$2,360.44. He mentioned the dues money for 2022 will be sent over the next month or so. Strauss has ordered the list of medals for the ROTC / JROTC awards to be presented in March – April 2022. Funds spent for the medal order is \$212.90, which is to be reimbursed by Texas SAR treasurer.

New Business: Chapter president Mike Connelley presented the slate of chapter officers for the year beginning April 2022. They are Jim Akers, president; Brandon Story, vice president; Mike Frye, recording secretary; Mike Connelley, secretary-annual reports; Christopher Strauss, treasurer; Bill Rowell, chaplain; Johnny Loomis, Sgt. At Arms. A motion to elect was passed and seconded. There was no discussion and the motion carried.

President Connelley also mentioned that the chapter has two members serving in non-electable positions. Bill Surles serves as the chapter webmaster and editor of the monthly newsletter. Jim Hobdy serves as coordinator of membership / publicity for the chapter.

The new chapter officers will be sworn into office at the April 2022 meeting.

A discussion was held on creating a color guard for the chapter. President Connelley noted it takes a minimum of three members to create a chapter color guard; a commander along with one person to carry the American flag and another member to carry the Texas flag. At present, only two people expressed interest in being part of the color guard, Brandon Story and Tom Richards.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:15AM with the attendance being 9 attendees; 8 members and 1 guest.
