Chapter President Jim Akers Message

Constitution Day, September 17, 2022 is the day that celebrates the meeting of those Patriots who, on September 17, 1787, signed the U.S. Constitution. The celebration of the Constitution was started by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) in 1955 when DAR petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week.

Local DAR Chapters in Denton County will no doubt be celebrating Constitution Week through various activities, including Bells Across America, an annual celebration of the signing of the U.S. Constitution. Participants will gather on September 17 to ring bells, just as church bells were rung when the Constitution was first signed September 17, 1787. We should expect to hear local bells being rung on September 17, 2022, precisely at 3:00 p.m. for one minute to mark the beginning of Constitution Week.



CADDO, KITIKITI'SH, CHOCTAW CULTURES: NEW NATIVE-FOCUSED BOOKS IN SPECIAL COLLECTIONS


Ancestral Caddo Ceramic Traditions (Various authors/editors, 2021).



Delve into the beauty and history of Caddoan pottery. Essays promote the understanding of specialized craft production and long-distance exchange; community and regional decorative variation; ancient Caddo cosmological and religious beliefs; and geographical variations. Two contemporary Caddo authors furnish an important Native perspective, drawing on personal experience to explore the meaning and inspiration behind modern pottery productions. This first-of-its-kind volume for Caddo archeology, *Ancestral Caddo Ceramic Traditions* is a valuable reference on ceramic practices across the broader southeastern archeological region.

The Caddos once inhabited a vast area in eastern Texas and parts of Louisiana, Arkansas, and Oklahoma, and their descendants have lived in southwestern Oklahoma since the middle of the 19th century. Caddo language is distantly related to Pawnee, Arikara, Wichita, and Kitsai within the Caddoan language family. *The Caddo Language: A grammar, texts, and dictionary based on materials collected by the author in Oklahoma between 1960 and 1970* by Walter Chafe (2008), expands earlier works, adding nouns and adjectives, a collection of representative texts and an English-Caddo dictionary.

Kitikiti'sh: The Wichita Indians and Associated Tribes in Texas, 1757-1859, Earl H. Elam (2008)



A historical study of the associated tribes of Indians in North Texas known as the Ousitas, Taovayas, Tawakonis, Wacos, and Yscanis from the time groups of the people entered Texas in about 1757 to the last remnants of the tribes were moved to present Oklahoma in 1859. Detailed, with notes, bibliography.

Choctaw By Blood Enrollment Cards 1898-1914 Volume XVIII (Jeff Bowen, 2020), transcribes



the contents of 6,100 Choctaw Enrollment cards from National Archive Film M-1186, Rolls 39-46. Cards list householders' ages, sex, degree of blood, the parties' relationship to head of household, county, Dawes Roll Number, and date of enrollment by the Secretary of Interior. Researchers will also find enrollee's parents' names, miscellaneous notes pertaining to the enrollee's circumstances, and whether a spouse was an Intermarried White.
