

Jim Akers Ancestor: Drury Holt

My ancestor, Drury Holt, was born on 12/29/1759 at Albermarie, VA, and served as a soldier in the Montgomery (Fincastle) County Virginia Militia during the Revolutionary War, and as a soldier in the War of 1812.

He was described as "a powerful, muscular man, bold, active and energetic, fond of sports and a social favorite, the kind of a man to gather around him a strong following of ardent and sympathetic admirers and to be a conspicuous character at all neighborhood gatherings." Drury inherited his father's (Nathanial Holt) physical and social make-up, in mid-life becoming more involved in religion and politics. He became a minister of the Church of the Disciples and "a man of some pubic note."

Holt volunteered for service with the Virginia Militia after his father, Nathan, was called to service for an additional term in the Continental Army. Drury and his brother reasoned that their father was becoming too senior in years to deal with the physical requirements of further military service, so Drury volunteered to go in his place.

Drury Holt, the husband of Sara Elizabeth Rogers, and father of Danswell, Mollie, Martha ("Patty"), Lucy, another daughter, and Drury Jr., died on about 2/16/1835 at Whitley City, McCreary County, KY as a result of injuries received in a tavern brawl, at the age of 75. He is buried in the Holt Cemetery, McCreary, KY.

Although it is unknown what battles Drury Holt fought in, the Virginia Militia participated in numerous battles in Virginia during Drury Holt's service, including the battle of Yorktown, VA, September 25, 1781-October 19, 1781.



Victory or Death: The Battles of Trenton and Princeton, December 25,

1776—January 3, 1777 by Mark Maloy (Emerging Revolutionary War Series)



An overview of the military actions and battlefields of three consecutive engagements during the "ten crucial days" of the American Revolution.

December 1776: Just six months after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, George Washington and the new American Army sit on the verge of utter destruction by the banks of the Delaware River. The despondent and demoralized group of men had endured repeated defeats and now were on the edge of giving up hope. Washington feared "the game is pretty near up."

Rather than submit to defeat, Washington and his small band of soldiers crossed the ice-choked Delaware River and attacked the Hessian garri-

son at Trenton, New Jersey, on the day after Christmas. He followed up the surprise attack with successful actions along the Assunpink Creek and at Princeton. In a stunning military campaign, Washington had turned the tables, and breathed life into the dying cause for liberty during the Revolutionary War.


The campaign has led many historians to deem it as one of the most significant military campaigns in American history. One British historian even declared that "it may be doubted whether so small a number of men ever employed so short a space of time with greater or more lasting results upon the history of the world."

In Victory or Death, historian Mark Maloy not only recounts these epic events, he also takes you along to the places where they occurred. He shows where Washington stood on the banks of the Delaware and contemplated defeat, the city streets that his exhausted men charged through, and the open fields where Washington himself rode into the thick of battle. Victory or Death is a must for anyone interested in learning how George Washington and his brave soldiers grasped victory from the jaws of defeat.

FOLLOW YOUR ANCESTORS' MOVEMENTS IN AMERICAN MIGRATION ROUTES, PARTS I & II


Have you ever wondered how your ancestors travelled across our nation? Have you wished you could follow their migration path? Two books new to Emily Fowler Special Collections might be the books you need to prepare for a future trip along your family's path.



American Migration Routes Part 1 - Indian Paths, Post Roads & Wagon Roads, by William Dollarhide (2022), is 139 pages chock-full of 88 maps and 77 routes, illustrating a specific era of American transportation history:

Indian Paths to Post Roads (1630-1669) The King's Highway (1680-1765) Scots-Irish Wagon Roads (1720-1750) Trans-Appalachian Trails & Roads (1755-1796) Roads to the Ohio Country (1787-1818) Roads of the Old Southwest (1806-1832) Western Migration Routes (1821-1869)

Each chapter includes a locator map and an introduction to the historic era. The migration routes are enlarged on two side-by-side maps, with the left-hand page features the highlighted trace of a migration route on a modern highway map; the right-hand page traces the route on a county boundary map. The maps were designed to enable a road trip that follows the trace of an old migration route; an arrow symbolizes the road trip directions needed to repeat the trip today.



Dollarhide's second volume, *American Migration Routes Part 2 -Stagecoach, Steamboat, Canal & Early Railroad Routes* (2022) takes the travel routes of Henry S. Tanner's 1840 book *American Traveller*, and adds new maps for each of its 45 travel hub cities. Again, the routes are traced on a current road map, with an adjoining map showing current county boundaries. Modern driving directions are included, hyperlinked to Google Maps.

Migration routes included in this book: Turnpikes & Stagecoach Routes (1795-1845) Steamboat Routes (1815-1840) Canals & Waterways (1790-1855)


Early Railroad Routes (1830-1840)

Both books are updated from 1997 versions, and offer full (or nearly full) color throughout. Also included are Tables of Migration Routes for each chapter, with road trips, notes and links to historical references online.
