Patriots Day commemorates the "midnight ride" of Paul Revere, who rode with William Dawes to warn the colonialists of the advancing British Army in 1775. As you know, Denton Chapter Compatriot Tom Richards is a direct descendent of William Dawes. The presentation is scheduled for 9:00 am in the Commissioners Court, 1 Courthouse Drive, Denton, TX. Please plan on attending, and if you have a uniform, please consider wearing it to the presentation.

The Denton Chapter has been invited to attend the Dallas Chapter meeting on April 8, 2023, at Ventana by Buckner, 8301 N. Central Expressway, Dallas, Tx. The speaker will be the new Texas SAR President, Sam Massey, as well as a speaker on the topic of "Hamilton vs. Jefferson." This parade caps off a three-day celebration of Medal of Honor winners, and there are usually six or seven Medal of Honor winners. Color Guard member Requirements

A member must have a Continental or Militia uniform. The militia is the least expensive and easiest to obtain. It requires a white pair of jeans, checkered or striped shirt and a tricorn hat or round hat costing about 50 \$

The time commitment is minimal where members participate based on their schedules and availability. Events normally last for one to two hours.

Color Guard participation is fun and exciting where they interact with the public, especially with children.



# The Winter that Won the War: The Winter Encampment at Valley Forge, 1777–1778

"An Army of skeletons appeared before our eyes naked, starved, sick and discouraged." Gouverneur Morris recorded these words in his report to the Continental Congress after a visit to the Continental Army encampment at Valley Forge. Sent as part of a fact-finding mission, Morris and his fellow congressmen arrived to conditions far worse than they had initially expected.

After a campaigning season that saw the defeat at Brandywine, the loss of Philadelphia, the capital of the rebellious British North American colonies, and the reversal at Germantown, George Washington and his harried army marched into Valley Forge on December 19, 1777.

What transpired in the next six months prior to the departure from the winter cantonment on June 19, 1778 was truly remarkable. The stoic Virginian, George Washington solidified his hold on the army and endured political intrigue, the quartermaster department was revived with new leadership from a former Rhode Island Quaker, and a German baron trained the army in the rudiments of being a soldier and military maneuvers.


Valley Forge conjures up images of cold, desperation, and starvation. Yet Valley Forge also became the winter of transformation and improvement that set the Continental Army on the path to military victory and the fledgling nation on the path to independence.

In The Winter that Won the War: The Winter Encampment at Valley Forge, 1777-1778, historian Phillip S. Greenwalt takes the reader on campaign in the year 1777 and through the winter encampment, detailing the various changes that took place within Valley Forge that ultimately led to the success of the American cause. Walk with the author through 1777 and into 1778 and see how these months truly were the winter that won the war.



## The Barbour Collection and Beyond: Resources for Connecticut Researchers

If your ancestors called Connecticut home, then these books in the Denton Public Library Special Collections will be of particular interest.



The set, *The Barbour Collection of Connecticut Town Vital Records* by Lorraine Cook White and *Finding Early Connecticut Vital Records: The Barbour Index and Beyond*, by Linda MacLachlan (2019) each provide insight and access to one of the most important vital records collections available for the Constitution State. But what is the Barbour Collection?




The Barbour Collection of Connecticut Vital Records is an index to and transcription of most town vital records of births, marriages, and deaths from a town's inception to about 1850. It was first created by Lucius B. Barbour, examiner of public records (1911-1934). He directed a project whereby town vital records were copied and abstracted. He presented the completed transcriptions to the Connecticut State Library where the info was typed onto printed forms, which were then cut, producing twelve small slips per sheet. Slips were alphabetized, typed a second time, and bound into separate volumes for each town. The slips were then interfiled, forming a statewide alphabetized index for most surviving town records.

**The Barbour Collection of Connecticut Town Vital Records** is comprised of 55 volumes, each focused on a set of towns; for example, volume one contains records for Andover 1848-1879, Ashford 1710-1851, and Avon 1830-1851. DPL's Special Collections holds all 55 volumes. Coverage dates vary from town to town, and some town's records are more complete than others. Regardless, this resource is a must-use for any researcher with Connecticut roots.

New to the DPL bookshelves, *Finding Early Connecticut Vital Records: The Barbour Index and Beyond* identifies the original sources of millions of early Connecticut vital records abstracted in the Barbour Index. From an online review: "Finding Early Connecticut Records contains a town-by-town bibliography of both Barbour's actual sources for the information in his Index and all vital records not in the Barbour Index that may be in church and cemetery records, town records, and published sources. For each town we are given the Family History Library (FHL) film numbers for derivative and original sources that have been microfilmed, and other source information for those that have not. These town chapters also note (in boldface) discrepancies and other town records that Barbour did not abstract."

## "Voices of the Revolution"

It was the spring of the year 1778 as I believe. David Brower was my Captain, James Woods, Lieutentant, I was Ensign, and William Brown, Sergeant.Robert McCannas was our Major, Thomas Dugan, Colonel and Butler, General.

Our objective was the destruction of the Tories. The next day after we left Johnsonville, our place of rendezvous, our Captain and three men were killed by the Tories who waylaid us. The Tories were commanded by Major Rainey and fired on us from a steep hill on the side of Brush Creek. After Brower was killed, Woods became Captain and I became Lieutenant. We pursued the Tories about forty miles to Fork Creek and there beseiged them in a house belonging to one John Needham. In the morning before we got to Needham's, our Colonel (Dugan) joined us.
