It is also an opportunity to meet members of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Military Order of the Purple Heart, The American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other patriotic organizations.

Denton Compatriot and Color Guard Commander David Cook participated in a Naturalization Ceremony with the North Texas SAR Color Guard posting the colors on April 17, 2003. This ceremony, held at the University of Texas at Dallas included 18 state color guard members, and welcomed new US Citizens.

As promised in last month's President's Message, Denton County Judge Andy Eads and the Denton County Commissioners Court issued a proclamation on April 18, 2023 proclaiming April 19th 2023 as Patriots' Day in Denton County. As you know, April 19th is the day in 1775 that some historians regard as the start of the Revolutionary War when William Dawes, Paul Revere, and Samuel Prescott rode to warn John Hancock, John Adams and the patriots guarding war supplies at Concord, MA of the advancing British Army. Chapter members Randy Nusbaum, Mike Connelley, David Cook, and Jim Akers were present for Tom Richards to accept the procla-

mation. Tom's patriot ancestor is William Dawes. We were also pleased to have DAR Regent Andi Tart and Vice Regent Soundra Smith of the Flower Mound Chapter accept the proclamation on behalf of the DAR.

This month Compatriot Scott Smith accepted a Proclamation from the Trophy Club City Council designating April 19th as Patriots' Day in Trophy Club. These Proclamations will be on display at our next meeting. Scott took this project on himself, and saw it to completion. Please take the opportunity to congratulate Scott personally on this project.

Scott's leadership suggests another project for our Chapter. If you have someone you know, or are just interested in getting to know someone on the city council of one (or more) cities in Denton, Cooke, Wise, Montague, or Clay counties please let me or Brandon Story know. With your support, we would like to give the city council of other cities the opportunity to recognize July 4th by signing copies of the Declaration of Independence and as Independence Day in those cities. This is another chance to further our goals of patriotism, history, and education.

On April 22, 2023 Denton Chapter members Brandon Story, Bobby Samuel, Jeff Akers, Bill Surles and Jim Akers attended the annual Medal of Honor Parade in Gainesville, TX. part of the Texas SAR Color Guard.

Chapter member David Cook rode on the SAR float, along with between 60 and 70 SAR members including State President Sam Massey, either riding on the float or marching as part of the Texas SAR Color Guard. This year eight of the 66 living Medal of Honor winners were in the parade, along with parade entries from other patriotic, historic, and educational organizations. This annual event conducted each April is something I hope you will consider for next year.

Peace Officers Memorial Day falls on May 15 this year, as part of National Police Week. This is a week set aside by Presidential decree to honor the men and women who risk their lives every day in the line of duty. We don't have anything planned as of this writing, but please stay alert to any emails announcing police awards by the Denton SAR.

Please remember that Monday, May 29th is Memorial Day. Originally called "Decoration Day," Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May to honor those who died while serving in the U.S. Military. Denton County Commissioners Court Approves Proclamation Declaring April 19, 2023

Patriots Day in Denton County

What got the American Revolutionary War off to a quick start? The ride of Paul Revere on April 18 and April 19 of 1775, alerting the citizens of the New England colonies that the British were on the move. Remember - "the shot heard round the world".

True except for one thing: Revere did not ride out alone. Two other Patriots accompanied him; Samuel Prescott and William Dawes- all going in different directions to sound the alarm throughout New England. And most important from the Denton chapter view is that Denton Chapter member Tom Richards is a descendant of William Dawes.

The British Army activity indicated a planned crackdown on the local Massachusetts government. The Patriot plan was to warn the local citizens of the advance of the British Army. The Sexton at Boston's North Church used a lantern to alert the Patriots of the British advance. Revere and Dawes then rode to warn John Hancock and Samuel Adams in Lexington, and then headed toward Concord to warn the colonist of the British movement to capture military supplies in Concord. The ride played a pivotal role in future Colonial victories and in today is part of the lore of "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere...."

Denton Compatriots Jim Hobdy, Scott Smith, and David Cook prepared a petition to the Denton County Commissioners Court declaring April 19th "Patriots Day" in Denton County, explaining this local historical connection to a major event in the creation of this Unites States of America.

Denton County Judge Andy Eads and the Commissioners Court approved a Proclamation declaring April 19, 2023 as Patriots Day in Denton County, Texas. The Proclamation was read in open court with several chapter members and members of the Flower Mound DAR chapter present in the audience.

Denton Chapter member Scott Smith also presented a Proclamation to the Mayor of Trophy Club for the naming of April 19th as Patriot Day by the Trophy Club City Council. The Proclamation was met with strong citizen support from those in attendance. All in all; a good day for American freedom and for the citizens of these North Texas communities.

Thanks to William Dawes, Paul Revere, and Samuel Prescott along with all the other Patriot solders of the American Revolution.

Color Guard member Requirements

A member must have a Continental or Militia uniform. The militia is the least expensive and easiest to obtain. It requires a white pair of jeans, checkered or striped shirt and a tricorn hat or round hat costing about \$50.

Townsend Company now offers costume Continental coats without lining and pockets for \$185 which is much less that the original coats for about \$500.


The time commitment is minimal where members participate based on their schedules and availability. Events normally last for one to two hours.

Generation by Generation: A Modern Approach to the Basics of Genealogy

Drew Smith's hot-off-the-presses book, *Generation by Generation: A Modern Approach* to the Basics of Genealogy, might be just the book you're looking for as a beginning genealogist struggling with where and how to begin your research.

Smith describes his 170-page book as, "...a better beginner's book..." "...organized in the same way that genealogical research should be done: starting with oneself, then one's living family and relatives, and then moving back in time, generation by generation..." Hence the book's title.

Smith's approach differs from most traditional how-too genealogy books in that those usually jump into describing each type of genealogical record set (census, probate, land, court, etc.), even if those are not immediately relevant to the researcher.

Instead, Smith focuses each chapter on the records relevant during specific historical time periods and moving backwards in time, highlighting the most valuable and relevant sources a researcher might want to seek to document his or her family.

Generation by Generation is divided into two sections:

Part I For all the Generations: Preparing to Research covers the basic topics all genealogists need to learn such as:

Names, Places, Dates and Events covers surnames, given names, suffixes, prefixes; place names, how they change, and how to find them; various calendars, etc.

Relationships—covering their names, how they are visualized, pedigree and family group sheet charts, etc.

The Genealogical Research Process—defining a research goal, the Genealogical Proof Standard (GPS), and what information researchers can find at each of the major genealogical websites

Additional chapters on Tools and Methods to Keep Us Organized, Looking for Previous Research, DNA Testing, and Using Online Repositories complete this section.

Part II Generation by Generation: Doing the Research is, in Smith's words, "...a slow and careful journey into the past." Each chapter covers the most important sources to use in documenting ancestors in that period.

Chapter 8 begins in the present and moves back to 1950 in the U.S.

Chapter 9 focuses on the U.S. from 1880-1950

Chapter 10, U.S. from 1850-1880

Chapter 11, U.S. from 1776-1850

Chapter 12, British America before 1776

Chapters 13-14 focus on Generations outside the U.S. and Generations with Records in Other Languages.

Chapter 15 "Now What?" wraps up the book.


Smith is right that "Each beginning genealogist's journey is unique," and that excepting our nuclear family, each of us has a unique set of ancestors that no one else has. *Generation by Generation* might open your eyes to a new approach to documenting your unique family's story.

Unhappy Catastrophes: The American Revolution in Central New Jersey, 1776-1782

(Emerging Revolutionary War Series)



"The Importance of the North River (the Hudson), and the sanguine wishes of all to prevent the enemy from possessing it, have been the causes of this unhappy catastrophe." So wrote General George Washington in 1776 as the British invaded New Jersey. Worse was to come, as the British overran the state, and the Americans suffered one unhappy catastrophe after another.

Central New Jersey witnessed many small battles and important events during the American Revolution. This area saw it all: from spies and espionage, to military encampments like Morristown and Middlebrook, to mutinies, raids, and full-blown engagements like Bound Brook, Short Hills, and Springfield. The British had their own catastrophes too. So did civilians caught in the middle.

In the fall of 1776, British forces drove the Americans out and secured the state. Following the battles of Trenton and Princeton, New Jersey became a battleground.

The spring of 1777 saw the formation of a new Continental Army, one that served the rest of the war. That spring, British and American forces clashed in a series of small but sharp battles.

By summer, British General Howe tried to lure Washington into a major engagement, but the Americans avoided the trap. As the conflict dragged on, civilians became engulfed in the fray, and a bitter civil war erupted, continuing until the end of the conflict.

In *Unhappy Catastrophes: The American Revolution in Central New Jersey, 1776–1782*, Robert M. Dunkerly follows the course of the war through its various phases and details lesser-known battles, military campsites, raids, espionage, and more. The book also includes historic sites to visit, markers, and websites for further research and study. This part of New Jersey saw more action during the Revolution than anywhere else in the young nation and has been called the Cockpit of the Revolution. To truly understand the war, look at central New Jersey.




ELECTION OF OFFICERS & EDWARD BEESON PART TWO FEATURED FOR MARCH SAR MEETING


