The Summer BOM Via ZOOM, July 29th What's happening in Texas SAR?

The Texas Board of Managers, also known as the "BOM" meet once, maybe twice a year, to discuss, debate, argue, "pontificate" on new ideas or concepts or programs for the Texas organization to follow and adopt. It is a forum where the State officers bring up new ideas or ideas coming from the National SAR organization to see how they will fit into and operate within the Texas organization.

So, who can attend? Well, any paid up, "card carrying" member of the organization can attend the various State meetings but voting is generally limited to those SAR members who are actually a part of the "Board of Managers". In most cases that would include all State officers, heads of various State committees, current chapter presidents and immediate past chapter presidents. If you are attending a State BOM meeting or a committee within that overall meeting and you don't fit into the above category of "voting members", just keep your hand down when a vote comes on the floor. Listen, ask questions, don't raise your hand to vote.

Most of the time these meetings are in person and located at various sites around the State. The majority of them are along what I would call the "I-35 corridor"; DFW metro area, Austin, Houston metro area, San Antonio. Sad to say you probably will never see one in Amarillo, Lubbock, Corpus Christi, Port Arthur / Beaumont or El Paso. The pattern right now is each year Texas will generally have two BOM meetings; one in person and one on ZOOM.



My "seat" at the BOM for all of the various meetings and discussion groups. I think the photo is from the Council of Chapter Presidents meeting which was around 8A. There were about 60 members attending this meeting; included State officers, chapter presidents and other interested persons. What was discussed? Got that below the photo.

The big advantage of ZOOM is obviously the informal, no travel format that can be used. There were probably about 60 +/- members in attendance at the Council of Chapter presidents meeting.

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Some of the goals of the year along with discussion centered around:

1. Member retention;

2. Member engagement /

3. adherence to rules and guidelines set forth by the National SAR organization, and

4. Financial management of chapters.

By 8:45A, the Council of Chapter presidents meeting concluded and we formally began the Board of Managers meeting at 9AM.

It was mentioned that the National Congress meeting which had just concluded some weeks earlier that a motion was adopted in which the National dues were to go up this next year. John Anderson, the State Historian, commentated that records retention program at UNT has now ended and the State will look at other options for the permanent retention of records.

A motion came up for the State of Texas to adopt the National SAR policy on rules, ethics and procedures. This passed in the Council and will be pushed forward to the regular BOM meeting.

Discussion was also held on the plan to fund a monument to be placed in Austin, Texas commemorating the 250th Commemoration on founding of the Country. It was mentioned that the amount required to proceed is \$60,000.00 and the current pledge amount is \$19,000.00. Efforts will be made to increase the monetary pledge amounts in order to proceed with this plan for a 250th anniversary statue.

Concern was expressed in the BOM over the use of "AI" (artificial intelligence) in our various youth programs: the essay contest and even in the Tik Tok video contest. No real answer except to be vigilant with the entries you receive and pay close attention to content of the entries you receive at the chapter level.

There was some discussion on the fact that some chapters are seeing difficulty in reaching / communicating with their members. Some members mentioned the concern that emails to members aren't even being read / opened by the member recipient. There was a discussion on this concern but no specific action or recommendation was made. The Houston chapter mentioned they use a special software package "Constant Contact" to analyze the email communication they have with members – how many opened / how many actually being read / etc., etc. Off net I contacted a friend of mine with the Houston chapter and he explained that the software they use (Constant Contact) cost about \$225.00 per year (maybe more).

John Anderson, State Historian, mentioned that the National SAR organization is preparing a new State History book, volume 3 and requests for purchase are coming out. He hopes to see a good representation of Texas members in the book. He feels it is a good way to preserve the Texas SAR history through individual writeups in the new edition coming out.

It was mentioned that the next BOM will be an "in-person" event in October 2023 at College Station, Texas "home of the Fighting Texas Aggies...." This is on a non-football game weekend in College Station. Should be a great event, especially if you have never been to College Station and / or the Texas A&M campus.

April of 2024 is the State Convention that will be in San Antonio; another great location for a convention.

Working with Veterans also came up at the BOM. It was requested that chapters look for veteran's clinics / facilities / etc. in your geographical area and try to set up some arrangements to visit, assist veterans. Small amount debit cards for veterans to use for small meals / snacks was one suggestion made.

The virtual BOM wrapped up about 1:45PM.

Over the years I have gone to many, many Board of Managers (BOM) meetings. They tend to be less formal and more business-driven events. I think it is a good place for chapter officers to observe the business activities of the organization in addition to making new and long-term friends within the organization.Mike

Constitution Week Sept 17 – 23, 2023

In celebration of Constitution Week- here are some fun facts:

The U.S. Constitution is the Oldest in the World

Since it became official on September 17th, 1787, the US Constitution has been its ruling government charter to date. It has been in existence for over two centuries, making it the oldest in the world. Even though countries like the UK and San Marino might have constitutions written centuries before the US Constitution, the US Constitution is known to be the oldest codified constitution, officially making it the oldest in the world.

Benjamin Franklin Was Carried to the Constitutional Convention

When the Constitutional Convention was to take place, Benjamin Franklin was 81 years old, and too weak and old to walk. Therefore, he had to be

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carried in a sedan chair to the convention. He was the oldest among the delegates, and his role during the convention was to urge delegates to support the documents. He also calmed delegates whenever heated debates ensued.

No One Had to Share What Happened at the Convention to the Public

The delegates were strictly ordered not to share any convention deliberations with the public. They had to keep all records of the event a secret for 30 years, and this was done to encourage the delegates to share their opinions without any fear. That being said, most people took notes during the convention, however, the notes of James Madison were the most detailed, and these were the only notes that gave us an indepth description of what took place during the convention.

Constitution on the move

The Constitution was placed with the Department of State in 1789 and stayed in its custody until 1921 when it was transferred to the Library of Congress. It was exhibited there from 1924 until 1954, when it came to the National Archives.

Have there been any Amendments Repealed?

Only one Amendment to the Constitution has been repealed—the 18th (Prohibition).

The Signers of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution

Six men signed both the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution: George Read, Roger Sherman, (yes- he is a relative), Benjamin Franklin, Robert Morris, George Clymer, and James Wilson.

Four pages, or five?

The four pages of the Constitution are on permanent display at the National Archives, but there is a fifth page. It is the Letter of Transmittal of the newly written Constitution to the Congress that existed under the Articles of Confederation. The letter, which briefly describes the Constitution, is signed by George Washington, president of the Constitutional Convention. It is dated September 17, 1787, the anniversary of which we celebrate each year as Constitution Day.

New Bluegrass State Resources Available in Special Collections



Kentucky & Its Kin: An In Depth Guide to

Genealogical Resources

Descendants of Bluegrass State ancestors will want to trot down to the Emily Fowler Central Library to dive into two new resources for Kentucky researchers published by the <u>Kentucky Genealogical Society</u>, and now available on the Special Collections shelves.

Locality is everything and the best research begins with understanding record availability for your research locale and where to find them. *Kentucky & Its Kin: An In-depth Guide to Genealogical Records in Kentucky and Beyond* (2023, 126 pages), touches on various repositories' holdings, ranging from the National Archives and the Kentucky Archives, to those in surrounding states of Virginia, North Carolina, and the Middle Colonies—as early Kentucky settlers often migrated from these areas and may have left records there. University and historical societies, bible and cemetery records, newspapers and indexes, the Kentucky Government Reference Service, and digital archives in and beyond the state are also featured. Sections devoted to researching African American individuals in the Kentucky State Archives, as well as an inventory of that repository are a plus. As one reviewer wrote, "This essential, brief primer is both a wonderful refresher for more experienced genealogists and a must-have for new ones."



Once familiar with Kentucky resources in all their richness, the *Essential Guide to Kentucky Family Research* (2023, 148 pages) will give you step-bystep guidance on how to piece together your Kentucky family history, from understanding the state's history to using genealogy tips and tricks.

Eighteen different authors contributed chapters, each giving their best insights from their unique perspective as Bluegrass State researchers. Photos, charts, maps, and personal stories bring richness to the guide.

Sections include: Understanding Kentucky History Basics of Family Research Finding Genealogical Sources Genealogy Techniques and Tricks Sharing Your Research

These are subdivided into several chapters each, covering everything from how Kentucky counties were formed, to finding marriages for formerly enslaved persons, to capturing disinterested family members, and much more.

As one Amazon reviewer wrote, the book "...answered questions I didn't even know I had!"

Both books are available for in-library use only in Special Collections at the Emily Fowler Central Library, 502 Oakland Street, Denton.
